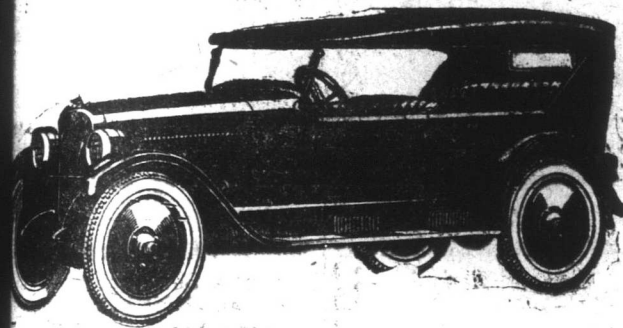

CHURCH FURNISHINGS DEDICATED.

The Lord Bishop of Newfoundland dedicated, on Sunday morning at St. Thomas's Church, new furnishings for the Church presented by members of the congregation. These consist of Chancel Chairs, subscribed for by the Adult Confirmation Class of 1919-21; and a Litany Desk, the latter being given by the Dowden family in memory of their father and mother. The chairs and desk are of English oak, beautifully carved, being designed by the well known makers of Church furniture, Messrs. Wippl of Exeter. Old St. Thomas's has recently been fortunate in the receipt of valuable gifts from the parishioners. It was only a few Sundays ago that a beautiful Memorial Window, the gift of the People's Warden, was unveiled and dedicated. The Rector announced in the last Church Bulletin that a member of the congregation has placed two Clergy Stalls in St. Andrew's Chapel, in memory of her brother. During the summer another parishioner presented the Chapel with Altar Service Books, giving them in memory of the late Canon Arthur Wood, who in 1894 established in the Parish the first Chapter of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew in this Diocese.

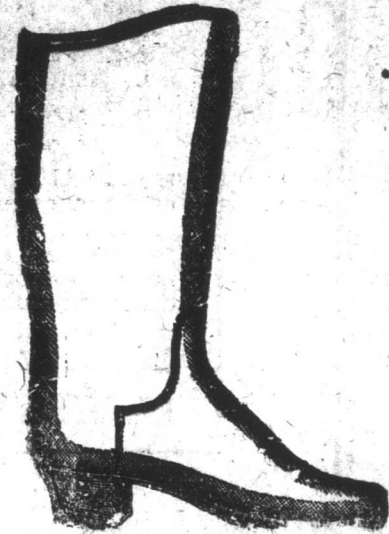

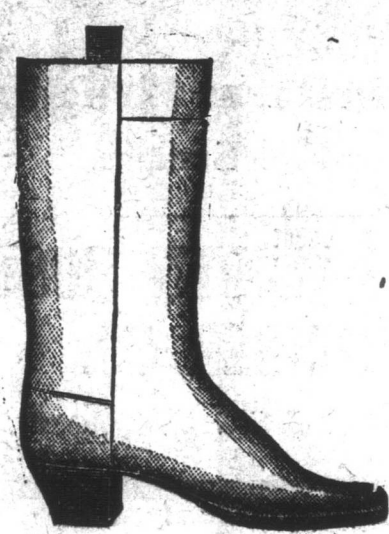

FACING FACTS.

"I could have a crackjack car if I didn't have to support you."

That, according to a wife who was seeking freedom (with ample alimony) on the grounds of cruel and abusive treatment, was a



one of the things her husband frequently said to her.

Of course he was cruel to say it. But, on the other hand, I wonder if she wasn't a fool not to realize that it was true and that it meant something in relation to their life together.

She Cost \$3,000.

According to the testimony he was a man who made a good income. They had no children. They lived at an apartment hotel which meant, of course, that she made a very small contribution in labor and time toward

the partnership. He gave her a reasonable dress and spending money allowance and, of course, paid her board. Presumably she cost him \$3,000 a year. If he had not had her to support he could have lived at that same hotel, paid someone a few dollars a week to do the mending for him and had the balance of that \$3,000 to spend on a car.

Of course it was a cruel thing for him to fling at her, but you can't quite get away from the truth, can you?

Would She Never Be Tempted?

And as I read the testimony I fell to wondering this. Suppose that woman, if she did not have him, could have had the luxuries she craved most—beautiful clothes, perhaps, and jewelry to outshine her neighbors, could have lived in the same comfort and could have had plenty of masculine society and all the masculine dattery she could stand—would she never think of that fact, would she never

be tempted to throw it at him? And, of course, there is no doubt that he could have all the feminine society, all the feminine dattery he wanted if he were in possession of his income and not married.

True, he had married her and it was up to him to share his income with her fairly. But wasn't it up to her to

recognize that he was sharing and to be grateful for it, instead of taking it as a matter of course as she most evidently had?

Many Wives Contribute More.

Of course that's not an average marriage. In many marriages the wife contributes as much to the partnership as the husband, and in some she contributes more. But there are many of the other kind, too.

All marriages have their basis in economic facts and in human nature as it is.
