This Preacher Believes in Church Advertising.

Rev. E. V. Stevens, pastor of the First Christian Church, of Eugene, Oregon, advertises and pays for his advertising, and has built up a wonderful regular attendance. This is what he has to say on the subject of church advertising: "I was taking the pastorate of a badly divided, discouraged and dying church. They were heavily in debt and had lost all hope of ever coming out of what seemed to them an utter, hopeless condition. One of the first things I asked of that church was the privilege of spending a certain sum of money for advertising. True, it was money they did not have, nor did it seem possible for them to get the money to spend in this way. I was repeatedly refused the appropriation, until I promised them that if they would try the experiment for a period of three months, and if after that experiment they found that it had not been successful, I would personally pay the entire bill. You can well imagine the result that came, for by the close of the three months not only had the advertising paid for itself several times, but the church had been filled with interested people, and the years of prosperity for that church had begun. The strange part of this matter of advertising to me is, that there should be any objection to it, when we remember that the church has been advertising practically during all her history. Church bells, tower chimneys, steeples, and physical equipment were the methods of advertising in the past, and many who have accepted these ancient methods without a word, criticize the modern plans of church publicity."—Newspaperdom.

Steel That Cuts Steel.

Not so very many years ago people were taught to believe that steel was ninety-nine parts iron and one carbon of charcoal. But to-day all sorts of other ingredients are added to the molten brew, and the result is steel of a hardness and toughness, hitherto unknown. Besides carbon, the principal ingredients used in making modern steel are nickel, manganese, chromium, tungsten, molybdenum, and vanadium. Manganese increases the strength of steel and makes it extremely hard, so that it can take a wonderful cutting edge and keep it. If you increase the amount the steel becomes so hard that it is unwearable. With a proper proportion of manganese a steel can be produced that will cut ordinary steel. Manganese steel is used for axes, picks, drills and for tramway points where the wear and tear is very heavy. Tungsten, which is found in Cornwall, acts in similar fashion to manganese and a small quantity of chromium produces a steel so tough that it will stand tremendous shocks. Chrome steel therefore is used for armour plates and for armour-piercing shells. Nickel steel is strong and light, and therefore admirably adapted for ship's propellers, and for machine tools, and for all articles that must withstand heavy wear and tear. The last three materials mentioned all make fine steels but are too rare and costly for common use. Sheffield still makes the best steel in the world. Its virtues are attributed partly to the secrets known only to its manufacturers, and partly to the waters used for tempering it. Sheffield water comes from the high moors and has flowed through miles of heath and bog, limestone and chalk. These have treated it by natural means in a way impossible to reproduce artificially. The Sheffield manufacturer uses iron and steel brought from many different places, such as Sweden, Norway, Canada and Spain, and then blends these with native ore in a way which has so far defied competition.

Turquoise Mines.

Much as we may read of it in fairy tales, a great deal more than the use of magic words is required to open the vast rocks and caves of precious stones that abound in many quarters of the globe. Prehistoric Mexican miners, for thousands of years before Columbus opened up traffic routes to the great continent, built enormous dikes against the mountainous rocks in which veins of turquoise were known to exist, to disintegrate the rock and yield up the precious stuff to the light of day. These great turquoise mines have existed since the dim ages in the depths of two great hills, called Mount Chalchihuitl and Turquoise Hill. On the side of the former are a number of ancient caverns, called by the early prospectors "wonder caves," or "mystery caves," which were worked by them for hidden gems. One of these pits is 150ft. deep, 200ft. across the rim, and 100ft. wide at the other end. The extent of the mining which took place may be judged from the vast dumps of waste material, which still cover an area of about twenty acres. As is always the case in these mines, a great bulk of the material is so mixed up with the rocky matrix as to have no value, but every now and then a suggest is found that is big enough to yield a fine gem.
