This resolution was adopted unanimously. Under it the Local Government and Assembly will, it is understood, proceed to devise means of con sinuing lawful and constitutional agi-They will probably reply to the Duke of Buckinbham's despatch, and urge that as the Dominion Govern ment has not proposed measures of re lief as his despatch seemed to promise, Nova Scotia has the right to renew the demand for separation from the Dominion. Other means of lawful agitation are advocated to which I have before referred. The idea is re-tained of requesting members of the House of Commons to absent them-selves from the sittings of the Domin-ion Parliament. Several Dominion members refused to commit them-selves to that course. The adoption of the moderate wing of the repeal party, as all the members of the Local Legislature yielded and voted for the resolution. It puts at rest all appre-hension of violent measures. It is said however, that the extremists resisted very stoutly, and for a long time it is surprising how much fear there was that a more violent course might be adopted. It is now believed that the Legislature will attend to the business of the country, which has been neglect-ed ince the Dominion was inaugurated.
