

TENDERS AWARDED FOR
NEW SCHOOL BUILDINGS

The New West End School Will
Cost in Neighborhood
of \$115,000

MORE ACCOMMODATION
NEEDED ACROSS RIVER

Hillhurst and Riverside Both
Require Additional
Room

Tenders for the contracts for the
building of the new Public school on
block 82, section 16, were awarded yes-
terday afternoon at a special meeting
of the school board held in Secretary
Wain's office.

The contract for a twelve room stone
building was awarded to the lowest
bidder, that of Messrs. Peers & Mac-
donald, for \$98,000, while the plumbing,
heating and ventilation went to a new
firm, Messrs. Grant Bros. & Co., for
\$15,577. Both contracts are
awarded subject to the bylaw carrying,
and to the firms tendering being able
to provide the necessary bonds to guar-
antee their work.

The flooring on both the buildings and
the plumbing and heating was very
good and came well within the esti-
mate of the architects, Messrs. Laline
& Dowler.

The following were the tenders re-
ceived:

For the building—D. McDonald,
\$115,329; G. H. Archibald, \$106,626;
Goudreau & McFarlane, \$99,504.50;
Peers & Macdonald, \$98,000; L. R. Burn,
\$115,583; A. A. McPhail, \$114,498.

For plumbing, heating and ventila-
tion—E. J. Young, \$15,011; E. L. Mar-
tin, \$15,570.65; Wm. Head & Co., \$15,
718; and Grant Bros. & Co., \$15,577.

The subject of starting domestic
science classes in the hall was again
taken up and on the recommendation
of Dr. Scott and H. A. Sinnott Miss
Morison, late of the department of
domestic science, Ingersoll, Ont., was
given the appointment of supervisor,
and Miss Stewart, late of the McDonald
college, Kingston, Ont., was appointed
assistant. Room for this part of the
Calgary educational system will prob-
ably be secured in the Benson & Hou-
lton building on 11th avenue west.

Dr. Scott brought up the necessity
of securing more accommodation for
the pupils in Riverside. He advocated
buying two lots and erecting a two-
storey frame building at a small cost
for temporary use.

In Hillhurst there are at present four
rooms with 50 pupils in each room
where there should only be forty. The
building committee was asked to se-
cure information about securing two
lots, and also as to the cost of con-
structing the building after the plans
adopted in Edmonton.

A meeting of the school board will
be held on Monday afternoon next at
6 o'clock to prepare the bylaw for
raising money to erect the school build-
ing on 11th avenue west.

Not Guilty of Manslaughter

GRADING TO START SOON
ON THE NEW C.N.R. LINE

The Strathcona-Camrose Line
Will Get Under Way Almost
at Once Says Gen. Mgr.

Strathcona, May 18.—General Man-
ager McLeod, of the Canadian Northern
line is authority for the information
that actual construction work will be
begun on the Strathcona-Camrose line
of the system within a few days. In a
letter to Premier Rutherford last week
Mr. McLeod states that grading will be
commenced as soon as outfitters can
be gotten on the ground.

Since the final survey for the
southeast line of the C. N. R. was
completed early in the spring, the
citizens have been daily expecting to
hear some announcement such as Mr.
McLeod now makes and it seems
probable that Strathcona will be
connected with Calgary by another
line of steel before next winter, since
the graders started south from Cam-
rose several months ago they have
been making splendid progress and the
latest reports speak favorably of the
grade reaching Calgary before the
summer is passed. The linking up of
the fifty miles or so between this city
and Camrose will complete the pro-
jected colonization extension from
Strathcona to Calgary, and this is to
be followed, before long with an air
line of the system through the country
southwest.

Nothing definite is announced as to
when construction on the Cam-
rose line will be begun but it is rea-
sonable to assume that the grade will
be pushed from the southeast end. The
C. N. R. has made Camrose a construc-
tion headquarters for some time and
work could be projected from there
with less expense than from this city.
It is a fact worth noting that the pro-
posed main line cut-off on the C. N. R.
between Strathcona and Lashburn will
touch this Camrose connection in the
vicinity of Beaver Lake.

The letter from Mr. McLeod reads:

"Winnipeg, May 12, 1910.

"Hon. A. C. Rutherford:

"I beg to acknowledge yours of the
6th inst. in respect to construction of
the line from Strathcona to Camrose
this year. We expect to commence
grading on the Strathcona-Camrose
line in a few days, as soon as we get
outfitters on the ground.

CANADIANS AT THE
FUNERAL OF LATE KING

Lord Strathcona Denies Some
Untruthful Reports Sent Out
to Canada and the Empire

London, May 18.—Sir Charles Fitz-
patrick, Mr. and Mrs. Aylesworth, Hon.
Sydney Fisher, Sir Hugh and Lady
Graham and many other distinguished
visitors have been accorded the right
of private entrance to the houses of
parliament to view the lying in state.
Lord Strathcona authorizes a denial
of what he calls a foolish statement
captioned "Canada," that he went to
Buckingham Palace to view the King's
body and was refused admission. He
went both there and to Marlborough
House to express Canada's loyal sym-
pathy in the usual way by signing the
book. Equally untrue is the mischief
making statement that Lord Strath-
cona took the colonial office severely
to task for its alleged neglect to in-
clude Canadian ministers and the high
commissioner at Friday's funeral cere-
mony.

Interviewed today, Lord Strathcona
said:

"We have no desire to be placed on
the same footing as foreign representa-
tives. We are nearer than they are. We
are an integral part of the Empire.
This is a vital distinction which we
are not likely to overlook."
The statement that Lord Strathcona
took the colonial office severely to task
for its alleged neglect to include
Canadian ministers and the high
commissioner at Friday's funeral cere-
mony, when foreign powers are
concerned.
