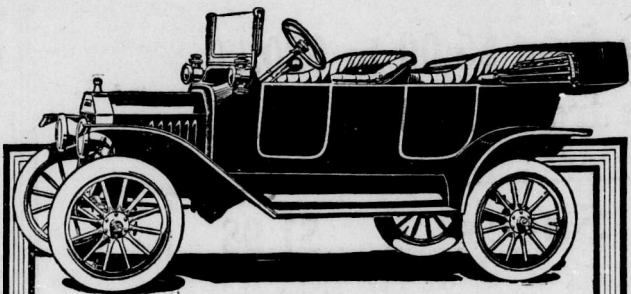

Changes in Train Service Canada Pacific Railway, Effective Monday, March 1, 1915.

PARIS, Feb. 23.—A Zeppelin airship bombarded Calais yesterday morning, according to an official statement issued last night. It dropped projectiles which killed five persons, all civilians, and caused some unimportant material damage.

A despatch to the Havas Agency from Calais says that a German dirigible airship dropped a number of bombs yesterday, which did slight damage to the St. Omer, Hazebrouck and Dunkirk railroad line in the vicinity of Pontinnettes. Train service over the line was immediately re-established. Two incendiary bombs damaged several dwellings in the village.

Pontinnettes is a little over a mile south of St. Omer, which lies twenty miles southeast of Calais.
