PARIS, Feb. 23.—A Zeppelin affship bombarded Calais yesterday
morning, according to an official
statement issued last night. It dropped projectiles which killed five persons, all civilians, and cause some unimportant material damage.

A despatch to the Havas Agency
from Calais says that a German dirigible airship dropped a number of
bombs yesterday, which did slight
damage to the St. Omer, Hazebrouck
and Dunkirk railroad line in the vicinity of Fontinettes. Train service
over the line was immediately reestablished. Two incendiary bombs
damaged several dwellings in the
village.
