and Build Up His Business. it Would Enable Him to Give More Work and Better Pay.

Fred T. Trebilcock, Wholesale and Manufacturing Jeweler, Tells How Reciprecity Would Affect Ris Busi-ness-He Would Double Ris Number of Employes and Increase Their Wages Twenty Per Cent.—Semething Worth Reading.

"Do I want reciprocity?" said Fred T. Trebilcock the other day, in reply to a question; "yes, I not only want reciprocity but I would like to go further and get free

guestion; "yes, I not only want reciprocity but I would like to go further and get free trade."

Mr. Trebilcock is a wholesale and manufacturing jeweler. His specialty is gold rings, and in this line he has probably the largest establishment in Canada, employing about 25 skilled hands.

"I'll tell you why I desire reciprocity," said he. "Once or twice a year I have to run down as far as the Maritime Provinces, at considerable personal expense, to secure orders to keep my factory running. The namber of jobbers in Canada is small, because the market is small, and to add to the difficulty that market extends over guch a vast area, that it requires a great deal of time and money to cover to. Detroit and Chicago I could go over to Detroit and Chicago I could get more orders in a day or two than I could in Canada in a month. Why? Because there is an immense market and so many large jobbers to supply it; and above all because I can SELL MY GOODS AS CHEAF AND IN MANY CASES CHEAFER TO THEM ITAM THEIR OWN MAUFACTURES. It seems hard to me when I go to Windsor that I cannot gross the river to Detroit, where I could gather in such a harvest but for the unnatural barrier of the tariff wall.

"Well, why don't you go to the

"'Well, why don't you go to the States?" some of my Conservative friends say. Now, isn't that patriotic advice to give a young manufacturer who is Canadian-born and wishes to live in his own country, who has established a business here and gives employment to 25 people, and who is interested in the prosperity of his native city! Is that sort of advice—coming as it does from those who profess to be so loyal to their cenutry—going to help build up that country.—And having established my business here, I need not point out the great outlay I would have to make in removing it to the other side. I have all along hoped that unrestricted reciprocity would be brought about, and I am still convinced that it is but a matter of a short time before that policy will triumph; but if I thought it was indefinitely postponed, I would remove my business to the United States. Already I have had good offers from the other side in thas direction."

"Do you think London would be a good business center in the event of trade freedom?"

"Do 1? Why, London is one of the very

business center in the event of trade freedom??

"Do I? Why, London is one of the very best commercial points on a the continent. Look at its geographical position. It is midway between the great markets of the east and the west. We have Buffalo, New York and all the great trade emporiums of the east on one hand, and Detroit, Chicago and the large western points on the other. We are in the direct line of railway communication with them, and they are easier of access from here than any other locality. As a distributing center London cannot be beaten; NO WONDER OVER 70 PER CENT. OF THE WHOLESALE MERGHANTS of the city are working for a policy that will enable them to derive the full benefit of these advantages. 
