ANDY REID'S CAREER.

Toronto World: Manager Irwin's
new catcher, Andy Reid, is a Toronto
boy, who learned the game on the Don
flats and on the field at Rosedale. He
was identified with several of the best
amateur clubs in the city when a
mere lad, he and his twin brother Eddie
being the star players on the Athletics,
junior champions of the city for a
couple of years. From the Athletics,
Andy graduated into the Carletons, and
joined the Wilkes in 1894, playing
with them when they won the senior
championship of the city. The Wil-
kes were regarded that year as being
one of the best amateur teams in Can-
ada. The next year Reid caught for
the Kemp Manufacturing Company
nine, which won the pennant in the
Commercial League. Reid's first pro-
fessional engagement was with Galt in
the Canadian League. He played be-
hind the bat until near the end of the
season, when the club disbanded, being
in second place. Last year Reid start-
ed the season with Charlie Maddock's
team, and did all the catching until the
disbandment of the nine, when he
went to London, succeeding Frank Snyder,
who came to Toronto. The London
management and enthusiasts praised
his work very highly, and naturally
compared his work with his predeces-
sor. Reid did not suffer any by the
comparison. When the Canadian
League disbanded, Reid was snapped
up by Manager Rowe, of Buffalo, where
he finished the season. Which Reid was
satisfied with Reid's work and
made an offer to him for next season,
which has been accepted. Reid has de-
veloped wonderfully the past couple
of years.
