TENDERS FOR ASPHALT.

Nine of Them Received, But Not Opened.

Cedar Blocks Have Been Taken from Dundas Street—The Union Wages Bylaw.

Nine tenders for asphaltizing Dundas and Richmond streets were before No. 2 committee for consideration last night, but owing to the arduous nature of the task, the opening of them was referred to Ald. Wm. Heaman, Engineer Graydon and the mayor. The tenders will be prepared in tabular form and considered at a future meeting. The main building at Queen's Park is in need of resurfacing, as there are leaks in almost every portion. The repairs will not be made until the committee ascertain whether the city or fair board should undertake the work. City Engineer Graydon recommended that tenders be called for the relaying of the flagstone walks on Dundas and Richmond streets, the work to be done during the laying of the asphalt pavement. The walks were in a very uneven state, and should be replaced. "From what item are we going to get the money?" asked Ald. O'Meara. "That's what I would like to know," replied the engineer. "There is no appropriation for the work." No action. Since the gas company began relaying mains on Dundas and Richmond streets, large quantities of the cedar blocks torn up have been appropriated by unknown persons. The mayor was brought to the council's attention, and Engineer Graydon had Detective Nickle make inquiry. He could only find that John Walters, Pall Mall street, Charles Castle, King street, W. Hayes, Wellington street, James Jones, Thames and Bathurst streets, and — Moran, Thames street, had received loads. Mr. Hayes was the only person receiving permission to take the blocks. "If we do not mind someone will take away the City Hall," said Ald. Parnell. "Wish they would," answered the engineer.

Ald. O'Meara—It is a wonder old Dundas has not been stolen before now.

The gas and telephone companies will be notified that the city will hold them responsible for all blocks removed from the streets by them.

Mr. J. P. Marks and representatives of several labor unions appeared in connection with the bylaw respecting the payment of union wages to men employed on city works. The bylaw was amended to provide for the payment of "prevailing union wages," and Mr. Marks was satisfied.

The members present were: Ald. Wm. Heaman (chairman), John Heaman, Parnell, O'Meara, Callahan, Nutkins, Secretary Bell, Engineer Graydon and Street Commissioner Owens.

THE TRIGGER.

Rollston, of the 37th Battalion, made 23 in a possible 35.

JOE PATCHEN'S FAST MILE. Davenport, Ia., July 12.—Joe Patchen paced a mile on the Davenport mile track in 2:05 1/2. It was the fastest mile ever paced so early in the year by a stallion. Carrie, a sulky, and the runner Josie B accompanied the big black as pacemaker.

CANADIANS ABROAD. Philadelphia, Pa., July 12.—The match between Ontario and Hertford, and when the stumps were drawn two whole innings having been played, the game was recorded as a draw. The visitors in their batting venture top scored the total of 224 made by Merion in their first inning, the side putting together 275 runs. Tucker batted finely and made 71. Mr. A. F. R. Martin, 47, Wadsworth, 37, E. R. Martin, 35, Sagamore, 28, and Goldsmith, 25. All played good cricket. The home team in their second inning made 146, for seven wickets.

CANADIANS WIN. Bulletin, Asbury Park, July 12.—Harley Davidson and Angus McLeod, the Canadian riders, competed in the preliminary heats of the two-third mile open, class B, this morning. McLeod was second in his heat, being beaten by E. C. Bald, of Buffalo. Time, 1:42 3/5. Davidson also was second in his heat, being led by A. W. Porter, of Waltham, Mass. Time, 1:40 2/5.

In the two-mile handicap, class B, special, Harley Davidson (120 yards) was fifth in his heat, and Angus McLeod (200 yards) won his heat in 4:31 3/5. Both are qualified for the finals.

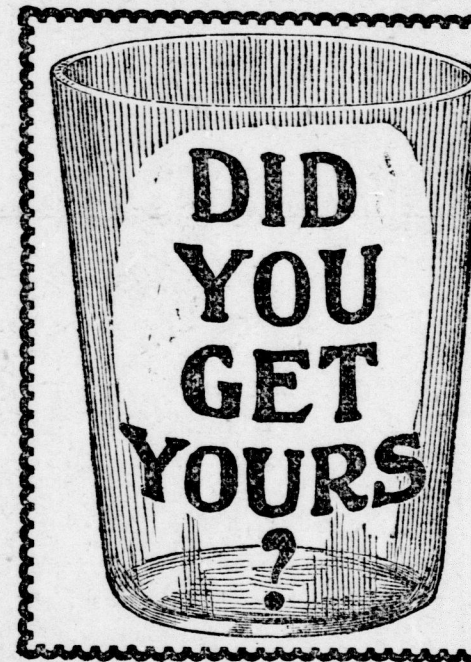

DREADFUL DEED.

An Unwelcome Suitor Kills a Young Girl and Her Brother.

Watertown, N. Y., July 11.—One of the most shocking and cold-blooded murders ever committed in Northern New York occurred last night at Chapel Hill, west of Lowville, Lewis county, and 35 miles from this city. The victim of the cowardly assassin, a 16-year-old, pretty Minnie Ingersoll, who lived with her brother, Eugene Ingersoll, and Nicholas P. Strife, an old man from Indian River, who was a farm hand in Ingersoll's employ. The murderer is John Hoch, aged 30 years, who was convicted of attempting to murder a young man in Denmark, Lewis county, several years ago, and who was sentenced to seven years at Auburn, but was pardoned after serving five years. Hoch met Miss Ingersoll this spring and became infatuated with her, but his attentions were not encouraged by the girl. On Wednesday morning he drove to Chapel Hill, but the girl's brother, Eugene, ordered him away. Hoch went away, but returned with a Winchester rifle, and shot both the girl and her brother.
