News of More Massacres!

Many Missionaries and Converts Killed at Tai Yueu Fu.

Japanese Alone to Occupy the Imperial Palace—An Attack From 30,000 Boxers Expected at Pekin—Famine at Tien Tsin Threatened.

London, Aug. 27.—The Shanghai correspondent of the Times, wiring Aug. 24, says:

"Li Hung Chang has received a message from Pekin that the Japanese alone will occupy the imperial palace. The Japanese Government has renewed its assurance that it will protect the persons of the empress dowager and the emperor.

SIXTY-SEVEN MASSACRED.
"Mr. Morgan, of the China Inland mission, who has arrived here from Si Ngan Fu, reports that 37 foreign missionaries and 30 converts have been massacred at Tai Yueu Fu.

"The Japanese Government has notified Earl Li that negotiations will be impossible until plenipotentiaries acceptable to the powers are appointed. Japan suggests the viceroys of Nanking and Wu Chang and Earl Li. If these are appointed and China expresses a willingness to make full indemnity, Japan is ready to assist to the utmost.

THE IMPERIAL CITY.
The imperial city is still invested, but has not yet been occupied. The allies, when the last report left, were still refraining from aggressive action pending instructions from their governments.

At a conference of ministers and generals, held at Taku Friday, it was decided, according to the Daily Telegraph, to refer the fate of the forbidden city to Europe. An

ATTACK FROM 30,000 BOXERS was anticipated, and to meet this the whole American force and the British artillery, according to a dispatch to the Morning Post from Pekin, dated Aug. 13, were moved to the outer city wall. The Boxers were reported coming south.

OUTSIDE PEKIN.
Gen. Dordard, in his report of the engagement outside Tien Tsin, Aug. 19, when the British, Americans and Japanese signally defeated a large force of Boxers, killing over 300, says, in a dispatch, dated Aug. 25: "The lines of communication near Tien Tsin are now free from danger. The enemy has been treating the villagers badly. Several decapitated bodies were found near their camp. The villagers are now flocking to Tien Tsin at the rate of about 1,000 a day. As there is not more than a month's food supply, there is every prospect of a famine shortly."

This declaration that a famine is imminent in consequence of the inadequacy of provisions for the hordes of refugees at Tien Tsin adds a new element of peril to the situation.

THE EMPRESS.
The Pekin correspondent of the Daily Telegraph, wiring Aug. 19, asserts that the empress dowager fled eastward, and adds: "She has a body-guard of 1,500, and as the mountainous character of the country would prevent artillery following, it is believed that she will be pursued."

This correspondent reports everything in detail to the date of his dispatch, but a telegram to the same paper from Tien Tsin, dated Aug. 24, asserts that the allies had pushed forward from Pekin with the intention, it is assumed, of pursuing the fleeing empress dowager.

Shanghai advices say that the report of the capture of Emperor Kwang by the Japanese was erroneous. It was a case of mistaken identity.

JAPS INSIDE.
"The Japanese troops are in possession of the wall around the innermost part of the forbidden city, but have not yet made their way to the imperial palace, owing to lack of government instructions."

Toronto Horsehoers on Strike—Hamilton Bakers May Go Out—C. P. R. Machinists Agree to Arbitration.

The C. P. R. machinists' committee at Winnipeg have agreed to arbitrate their differences with the company.
