and the emperor. SIXTY-SEVEN MASSACRED.

THE IMPERIAL CITY.

south. OUTSIDE PEKIN.

Gen. Dorward, in his report of the engagement outside Tien Tsin, Aug. 19, when the British, Americans and Japanese signally defeated a large force of Boxers, killing over 300, says, in a dispatch, dated Aug. 25: lines of communication near Tien Tsin are now free from danger. The enemy has been treating the villagers badly Several decapitated bodies were found near their camp. The villagers are now flocking to Tien Tsin at the rate of about 1,000 a day. As there is not more than a month's food supply, there is every prospect of a famine shortly.' This declaration that a famine is imminent in consequence of the inadequacy of provisions for the hordes of refugees at Tien Tsin adds a new element of peril to the situation.

THE EMPRESS.

The Pekin correspondent of the Daily Telegraph, wiring Aug. 19, re-asserts that the empress dowager fled eastward, and adds: "She has a bodyguard of 1,500, and as the mountainous character of the country would prevent artillery following, it is believed she will not be pursued." This correspondent reports everything quiet on the date of his dispatch, but a telegraph to the same paper from Tien Tsin, dated Aug. 24, asserts that a thousand Russians, Germans and Japanese had pushed forward from Pekin with the intention, it is assumed, of pursuing the fleeing empress dowager. Shanghai advices say that the report of the capture of Emperor Kwang Su by the Japanese was erroneous. It was a case of mistaken identity.

JAPS INSIDE.

"The Japanese troops are in possession of the wall around the innermost part of the forbidden city, but have not yet made their way to the imperial palace, owing to lack of government instructions."

London, Aug. 27.-The Shanghai cor- ; to St. Petersburg, under date of Aug. 16, says: "There are no longer any Boxers in Pekin. They were driven out today by the French and Russians, whose flags are hoisted over the im-

perial city. Gen. Frey, commanding the French forces at Pekin, telegraphs from there under date of Aug. 20: "The allies have driven the Boxers from all the points they occupied. The allies are camped outside the imperial palace."

Washington, Aug. 26.-Russia, Germany and Japan have not declared war upon China, either separately or in concert. This statement is made upon authority of the highest character. What those nations may do within the next forty-eight hours or within the next fortnight is a question which no one in Washington is prepared to answer. The brief dispatch from Che Foo, conveying a rumor current there that Russia, Germany and Japan had joined in a de-claration of war upon China, is not taken seriously. No information of such action has reached either the departgovernments primarily interested. That fact alone is accepted in official circles as a sufficient refutation of the rumor. The understanding among Washington officials of Russia's action is that the empire has declared the three provinces on its southeastern frontier in a state of siege. This is altogether different from a declaration of war. It corresponds to a declaration of martial law by Great Britain and to a suspension of the right of habeas corpus by the Unit-

ed States. RUSSIA'S OBJECTS.

Russia has two objects in operations in China—the rescue and protection of the foreign legationers and the protection of her frontier. The avowed object of the other powers is simply the rescue and protection of the legationers and other foreign subjects. other foreign subjects. In carrying out her second object Russia has seized New Chwang. This was done to obtain a base of operations from which Boxers were reported coming the frontier could easily be reached, precisely as Taku was seized as a base of operations by the allies in their operations against Pekin.

CHINESE ATROCITIES.

London, Aug. 26. - Further intelligence from Pekin shows that the fanatical hatred of the Chinese populace for the native Christians was in evidence to the last, everything belonging to the latter being utterly destroyed by the mob. A Central News telegram states that prior to the entry of the allied forces the Chinese imperial troops attacked the houses of the wealthier native residents, murdered many of the inmates, pillaged buildings and generally acted in an atroci-

BITS OF CHINA. The Japanese have landed more blue-

jackets at Amoy, where order is maintained in spite of the great excitement. The viceroy of Sze Chuen is reported at Shanghai to be sending troops to the Tonquin frontier, and to be intending to fight the French at Meng Tze. "Conspicuous gallantry was displayed by Capt. Gaussen, of the Bengal Cavalry," says the Shanghai correspondent of the Standard. "While under heavy fire in the recent fight at Tien Tsin, Capt. Gaussen stopped and picked up an American trooper, lifting him into the saddle and riding off in Since the dispatch from Consul Fow-

ler was received at Washington on Thursday night, the department of state has received no news from any sources in China, except a brief cable-gram from Minister Conger, inquiring how he should route his messages.

The foreign residents of Shanghat are alarmed at the arrival of the extraordinary number of warships, and are fearful of European complications, though they have been assured by some of the naval commanders that the gathering was accidental.

At St. Petersburg dispatch says: Gen. Grodekoff, commander of the Amur government, reports under date of Aug. 24 that Kam Ni and Tcha Tchan have been occupied by the Russians. Chinese sent an emissary to Gen. Rennenkampf proposing a suspension of full-grooperations, but the Russian general pound. replied that he was unable to cease

Toronto Horseshoers on Strike-Hamilton Bakers May Go Out-C. P. R. Machinists Agree to

Arbitration. The C. P. R. machinists' committee at Winnipeg have agreed to arbitrate their differences with the company. The Toronto journeymen horseshoers, over 60 in number, representing 50

shops in the city, will go out on strike today (Monday). Nineteen men go to work as usual in nine shops that agree to the men's terms, but the other 60 men who are employed in union shops will go on strike. In all there are about 100 blacksmith shops in the city, but only about 50 are recognized by the union, which is affiliated with Journeymen Horseshoers' International

Union of America. The Hamilton bakers' union mands that the shops shall be union shops; that the foreman shall receive not less than \$12 a week of 60 hours and journeymen not less than \$10 a week; that there shall be one apprentice to three men; that the union label. shall be stamped on every loaf of bread, etc. Some of the bosses have signed an agreement to observe these rules, but others have not, and it is stated that a strike will take place in
