C., occupied the chair, and in his opening remarks expressed his pleasure at being present. He had been a firm friend of the Boys' Brigade for years. He was a strong advocate of drill in the schools, and in Winnipeg had the pleasure of seeing it introduced very generally. It has a strong disciplinary effect. Col. Holmes referred to his connection with the Boys' Brigade in Winnipeg. He had inspected them every year. The first camp had been held on the historic ground, where Lord Wolseley landed in the Red River in 1870.

RESOLUTIONS

Passed at the Middlesex County W. C. T. U. Convention.

The following resolutions were passed at the Middlesex County W. C. T. U. convention, held in Somerset Hall, city, a few days ago:

Prohibition—Believing that the remedy for the evils arising from the liquor traffic lies in total prohibition and that the sentiment of the province is strongly in favor of a prohibitory law, resolved, that we endorse the action of the Dominion Alliance in declaring for prohibition by provinces, and that we direct our energies in the direction of assisting in the attainment of this most desirable end.

The Cigarette—Whereas, physicians, educationalists and all those interested in the welfare of our youth declare the cigarette to be pernicious beyond words to health, mind and morals, and whereas, in spite of this fact, the use of the cigarette among boys is steadily increasing; resolved, that we express our detestation of this habit and our determination to fight it to the death; and that through Sunday schools and public schools, Epworth leagues, Christian Endeavor, ministerial associations and any other religious body we will endeavor to educate and agitate until the public mind is fully aroused upon this subject. And finally, that we faithfully circulate our petition.

Franchise—Whereas, we believe that the ballot in the hands of women is the quickest route to the prohibition goal and that it will also be conducive to the betterment of conditions among women generally; resolved, that we devote ourselves earnestly to the work of this department during the coming year by plentifully scattering literature and obtaining every available signature to our petition; and, that we The Canteen—Whereas, in the past, the canteen in our military camps has been a great source of evil, and the means of leading many into drunkenness and, whereas, in accordance with the earnest protests of the W. C. T. U.,

there was very decided improvement of the conditions this year; resolved, that we express our deep appreciation of the better order of things, and our earnest hope that in the coming year the law prohibiting the sale of liquor in camps may be rigidly enforced.

The Lord's Day—Whereas, as Christian women, we are fully persuaded that God's command to keep his day holy is of paramount importance and that its unhindered observance will result in disaster to both home and nation; resolved, that we heartily cooperate with the Lord's Day Alliance in its noble efforts to throw safeguards about this great day, and that we prove the sincerity of our convictions by patronizing those merchants who favor Saturday night early closing, and also that we refrain from Saturday night shopping.

Narcotics—The campaign against the cigarette is but begun. Unless past efforts are quadrupled no tangible good will result from the movement; therefore recommended, that every union be urged to vigorously prosecute the circulation of the petitions, securing the signature of church boards, Sunday schools, young people's and temperance societies, and all other organizations willing to co-operate together with the names of men who are of influence in the community; further recommended, that the literature now being published under the provincial department be scattered broadcast throughout every town and village in our county, which can be reached by the county union or local societies.

County Work—Owing, no doubt, in part, to the removal of the late county executive, county work has become somewhat disorganized, and the close bond of sympathy that should exist to exist between us as workers, weakened; therefore recommended, that the names of as many workers as will agree to attend a regular or parlor meeting held by a union other than their own, rendering what assistance they can in the programme, be secured and given the county president, whose duty it shall be to plan the best method of using these volunteers.

Interim Executive Meeting—Realizing the need of a closer bond between the Middlesex societies, and feeling that nothing but personal contact can accomplish this; recommended, that a meeting of the county sub-executive, including the presidents of local unions, be called to meet between conventions. That time and place be left to the officers, and that each local union be asked to pledge itself to send its president.

Scientific Temperance—Having regretfully heard of the proposed change in the public school curriculum whereby the subject of scientific temperance would be dropped from the course, recommended, that each union make an unusual effort to interest the teachers in its section in the faithful teaching of this subject; and that, to this end, the possible teachers' reception, to which the public school staff of instructors and trustees are invited, and at which brief addresses upon the cigarette problem, shall form the main part of the programme, be held.

Non-Alcoholic Medication—Recommended, that wherever practicable, each union procure Mrs. M. A. Allen's work on non-alcoholic medication to loan to physicians in the locality, believing that through this simple agency the eyes of many of our practicing physicians will be opened to the possibilities of an effective means being employed for restoratives, etc., as that which often creates a desire in the patient for strong drink.

Temperance in Sunday Schools—Realizing the necessity of systematically presenting to our Sunday school scholars the doctrines of temperance, recommended, that the new Temperance Quarterly, prepared and published by the Provincial W. C. T. U., be distributed to all the Sunday schools throughout the province, through the medium of our union, whose business it will be to urge upon the Sunday school superintendents and teachers the necessity of procuring such. We would suggest that in order to facilitate this work, the local unions purchase the first set of leaflets and give them to the Sunday school superintendents and teachers in their locality.

Franchise—Whereas, the franchise petitions are to be presented at this winter's session of the Ontario House, and all possible pressure should be brought to bear upon the legislators, recommended, that letters be drafted by the sub-executive and sent to the county and city M.P.'s and the premier, requesting their vote in favor of the extension of suffrage to women.

Unfermented Wine—It is now some years since any marked advance has been made in the reform this department advocates. While many churches and some whole denominations are free from the guilt of representing the saving blood of Christ by that which is the world's direst curse, whole denominations, including about 1,000 Protestant ministers, still cling to this relic of the dark ages. Therefore, recommended, that the literature campaign suggested by the provincial department be issued, be carefully considered and faithfully worked out by our societies. And that the campaign include country churches in the neighborhood of each society.

Mothers' Meetings—Throughout our province this department has this year advanced greatly in the favor of our workers, because it enables them to present to the home-makers the claims of the various reforms in which we are interested. Recommended, that every union have at least one such meeting during the year, giving the programme a social purity, narcotic, scientific temperance or household economic trend, and that literature in accord with the topic be distributed.
