BROKE THE BLOCKADE.

Snow-Drifts Twenty-Five Feet High—

Picks and Crowbars Needed to

Smash the Crust.

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 12.—For the first

time in two weeks all trains on the Union

Pacific and Northern Pacific are reported

on time. The snow blockade is broken and

freight is moving in all directions. The

late storm in the gorge of the Columbia

River through which the Union Pacific

passes was the worst ever known. Snow

and sleet formed in such solid masses that

even the rotary plow could not grind

through it. Some drifts were 25 feet high,

and men had to go ahead of the rotary

plow with picks and crowbars and smash

the crusts that the plow could take hold.

After the first part of the road was passed

the rotary plow came through drifts to 15

feet high at the rate of four miles an hour.
