BLACKMAIL IMPOSED ON VICE!

Startling Allegations Made by a New York Paper

In Connection With the Reform Campaign in the American Metropolis—Corruption Fund of Over \$5,000,000 Raised.

New York, Jan. 7.—Allegations are made here this morning by the Herald in effect that confession has been made that vice in this city has been compelled to pay over \$5,000,000 annually for protection. The newspaper says:

"Startling revelations regarding the system of blackmail levied upon vice and crime in this city have been made by a man who has long had prominence as a successful gambler. His story, which is in the nature of a voluntary confession, has been told to W. M. K. Oleott, former district attorney. Prof. Oleott has been furnished, and more will be forthcoming if demanded."

BIG CORRUPTION FUND.
"It is computed that a corruption fund of \$5,000,000 was collected last year. Of this vast sum one-half was the result of vice made up from gambling houses and kindred establishments."

"After quoting Mr. Oleott's admission that the ex-gambler's confession had been made to him, the Herald details the methods thus: 'So exact is the system of extortion in operation that the commission which assesses, collects and divides the blackmail, knew in advance just what the profits for the year would be. The city was blocked off into districts, and a levy was made each for a given sum. The money was obtained by compelling the violators of the law to pay in proportion to their earnings.'"

THE DIVVY.
"The entire amount was divided into 24 parts for the purpose of distribution. Of these parts four went to the great man, whose consent had to be obtained before the system could be put into operation. He simply pocketed \$500,000 and looked happy."

"Others were compelled to accept much smaller shares of plunder. Fourteen entered directly into the division of money, and some were compelled to satisfy themselves with a single share. But the purse was deep, and the smallest fraction represented \$200,000, which was sufficient to warrant the division with men outside who are strong enough to demand a few crumbs."

Joseph Chamberlain On England's Future.

Joseph Chamberlain, whom many charge with the Boer war, has a vigorous article in Success for January, in which he gives to the American people his conception of the destiny in store for England, now that her empire is practically a unit. He says:

"What should we be without our empire? Two small islands, with an overcrowded population, in the North-Sea. What would they be without us? Fragments—nations, indeed, but without the fulness of national life, without the cohesion that enables them to look the world in the face. We are bound together also, by something which, in international and national affairs, is perhaps, even stronger than material interests—by the ties of sentiment, by common ideals and common aspirations. We crave from them, from our kinsfolk, from our fellow subjects, their affection; we delight in their sympathy; we delight in their support."

"That does not mean that we are hostile to other nations. On the contrary, we desire their friendship, too. We should be glad to have their approbation, if it were not purchased at the cost of more essential objects. We hope that they will reciprocate the friendly feelings which we express and feel for them; but, if not, we will humbly submit to our destiny, we will endeavor to do without it, we will content ourselves with what we can get. If we cannot persuade them, then we must be isolated; but, if even then, we are surrounded and buttressed by these groups of sister nations, I say, in the words of the Canadian statesman, our isolation will be a splendid isolation. I do not say this in a spirit of vulgar ostentation. I do not think the view I am putting before you is an ignominious view of our national destiny. No, it is better for all of us; it widens our horizon and broadens our view; it is free men in a company of nations, to be citizens of no mean city. We have the comfort of knowing that, if even the worst of disasters were to overtake this country; if we were to be, as is often prophesied, the victims of a fallen empire; or if, by some physical convulsion of nature, we were to sink like a volcanic island in the sea; that we have ruled so long, even then we should leave behind kinsfolk across the Atlantic and on the Pacific seas, and they would carry to distant ages and to unknown heights the scepter of our great dominion."

Happenings of the Hour.

Mr. Kennedy independent, was probably elected to the Quebec Legislative Assembly in Gaspe.

Messrs. Vipond, Peterson & Co., wholesale fruit merchants, Montreal, assigned. Their liabilities are \$40,000.

The car shops of the Virginia and Southwestern Railroad at Bristol, Tenn., were burned Saturday. Loss, \$100,000.

The West Point hazing case was resumed today (Monday) before the congressional committee at Philadelphia.

There is some talk of Dr. J. O. Reame being the candidate of the North Essex Conservatives in the next provincial election.

Mr. Wm. Bernard Wallace has been appointed judge of the county court for Halifax county, in place of the late Judge Johnston.

Smallpox has been effectively stamped out in New York, according to the officials of the board of health. Over 7,000,000 persons have recently been vaccinated.

The action brought some time ago by Mr. J. M. Lottich against ex-Mayor George Roach, of Hamilton, for \$10,000 damages for alleged slander, has been settled out of court.

Currie's fruit store, Reesor's jewelry store, Todd's ticket and agency office, Hall's real estate office and Botting's barber shop, at Brandon, Man., were burned Sunday. Loss not stated.

Thomas Young, who conducted a stock broker's business at Halton, Ont., some years ago, was arrested Saturday on a charge of defrauding Ferdinand G. H. Pattison out of \$1,000. He was jailed.

Frank Folett, aged 19, of South New Berlin, N. Y., went to a surprise party as the escort of Miss Blanche Sargent, his fiancée. The lady killed with another youth and Folett killed himself with a revolver.

Fruit growers in South Essex are complaining of the destruction of their peach trees by rabbits. In one orchard over 300 trees were gnawed by the pests, which have appeared in large numbers along the lake shore.

Governor McCallum, of Newfoundland, has been appointed to succeed Hon. Sir Walter Francis Hely-Hutchinson as Governor of Natal and Zululand. A feeling of regret is general at Governor McCallum's leaving the colony.

The citizens of Kingsville are making elaborate preparations for the reception to be tendered to seven Kingsville boys who saw service in South Africa with the Canadian Mounted Infantry. The boys are expected home this week.

Glass manufacturers of Pennsylvania and Eastern States are taking steps to organize a trust. Concerns representing \$20,000,000 are said to have already signed an agreement, and it is expected to include capital amounting to \$50,000,000.

At Winnipeg on Sunday the premises and stocks of the Grundy Music Company, Barrowclough's music store, H. P. Marvy, pianos and organs, T. C. Thurman, jeweler, and the Winnipeg theater box office were burned. The temperature, which was twenty below zero, hampered the firemen considerably.

It has leaked out that during the past two months the mails have been robbed at Moncton, N.B. One bag stolen contained 1 C. R. checks to the value of \$12,000, which, however, had been indorsed before the money could be collected. At Shediac a bag containing registered letters was stolen.

En T. Bangs, aged 75, a well-known contractor and millionaire, died at his home at Fayetteville, N. Y., after a long illness. He had been engaged in many important government contracts, and his notable work being the construction of Sault Ste. Marie locks, Delaware breakwater and Charleston harbor.

A team of horses belonging to Joseph Shih, of Ancester, ran away in Hamilton Saturday, and threw Smith out, injuring him. On the C. P. R. bridge the animals dashed into a rig occupied by Mrs. Blinn, of Greely, and threw him to the ground cutting his head. Blinn was taken to the General Hospital and his recovery is very doubtful.

A deadlock has arisen in the Court of Appeals at Toronto, as the result of the retirement of Chief Justice Giesbregt from the bench. The Lord's Day case was argued before a bench of five judges, of whom Judge Burton was one. He retired shortly after the hearing, and judgment in the case was not given. The case is to be reargued.

A stove in the residence of Miss Cunningham, Amherstburg, was wrecked by the hot water attachment. The water became frozen in the pipes during the night and when they were thawed the steam generated so quickly that the pipes burst, Miss Wear, who was in the room at the time, received a bad scalp wound by a piece of the flying pipe.

The session and managers of St. Andrew's Church, Sarnia, have, on behalf of the congregation, presented Mr. Francis Blackie with a purse of \$300 as a small recognition of the 38 years' services as clerk of the session. They also, on behalf of the board of managers, presented Mr. Henry Barnett with one quarter's salary in recognition of his faithful service as sexton of the church for over 40 years.
