IN DIRE STRAITS!

Chinese in the Shan-Si District Literally "Eating Each Other" to Avoid Starvation.

Des Moines, Ia., May 3.—Minister Conger received messages from a New York paper asking his co-operation in giving relief to starving millions in Northern China. His telegram in reply was: "The Christian Herald, New York.—Your telegram received. The suffering of the famine-stricken people in Shan Si is indescribable. Your plan of relief is the best. Put matters in hands of our consuls at Shanghai and Tientsin and heads of missions there. Chinese government and people will be grateful; demands of humanity will be answered, and future good will result. I send by letter \$100." "E. H. CONGER."

Minister Conger says that the condition of the unfortunate people referred to is beyond description. "Prince Ching told me only two days before I left Pekin," said Minister Conger, "that their people were literally eating each other. They have eaten every blade of grass, every bit of bark—everything, in fact, that can be eaten. In that province. Nothing has been raised there for two years, and unless relief is given many, many thousands must perish."

OBLIGED TO BACK DOWN!

Balfour Yields to Pressure for Postponement of Vote on the Coal Tax.

The Proposed Export Duty Vigorously Opposed by Sir William Vernon Harcourt—The Chancellor's Reply—General Cable News.

London, May 2.—Yesterday Mr. Balfour was determined to get a vote on the coal tax before the house rose, and rejected Sir William Vernon Harcourt's private appeal for a postponement. At a late hour, however, so many members were anxious to speak that the speaker gave it to be understood that he would not consent to an application of the closure. The government was therefore reluctantly COMPELLED TO YIELD.

In their determination to strike appears this morning more doubtful, consideration of the matter for twenty-four hours having somewhat modified the opinions of the leaders, but no reliable indications are yet available.

THE DEBATE.

The full house and galleries had to wait until nearly 6 o'clock for the beginning of the coal tax debate. Sir William Vernon Harcourt (Lib.) really led with a severe, almost violent, arraignment of the government. He said the tax would throw the coal trade into chaos and confusion. It would be a return to the days of the coal strike, and was a most unbusinesslike way of dealing with a great trade. It was an extraordinary and vexatious piece of bungling. It was nonsense to say the foreigner would pay the tax, because he could not do without coal. The government of Italy had answered by taking coal from America instead of this country. The trade of France was equally divided between this country, Germany and Belgium.

The chancellor of the exchequer, Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, interrupting, said: "We are beating the others." "Then go on beating them," said Sir William Vernon Harcourt. "Why throw a shilling into the scale against the country?" Sir William contended that it was class legislation and that the tax would ultimately come out of the miners' wages.

THE CHANCELLOR'S REPLY.

The chancellor of the exchequer admitted that the tax, like every tax, was an obstruction on trade. The real question was, the expected trade in coal bear the tax? It could, English coal was of so good a quality; there was much of it, and it could be presented in the immediate future, to a large extent, it was free from competition. The chancellor submitted masses of statistics, which he summarized as showing 25,000,000 tons were mined in 1900, on which, after deducting 218,000,000 in wages more than in 1897, left the coal owners a net profit of £29,000,000 on a capital of £110,000,000. He had some difficulty in keeping his patience when deputations talked to him about the unprofitable condition of trade. He had proposed the tax for merely one year, and it would be on those who were able to bear it.

COMPETITION OF THE UNITED STATES.

As to the competition of the United States, Sir Michael Hicks-Beach said: "Last year the price of export coal at the port of export was very much higher than the price of coal in the United States, but in 1900, the price of export coal was \$8,000,000 tons, or 3,500,000 tons more than the previous year. The United States exported a little over 6,000,000 tons. If the United States could not compete when the price of our coal was very high, it would be absolutely impossible for them to compete when the price of our coal was low."

JOHN REDMOND SPEAKS.

Mr. John Redmond, the Nationalist leader, said the coal tax did not affect Ireland, and in that respect it was the beginning of a new era. On general principles, however, he urged Irish members to do everything pos-

The Turkish mission, under Enver Pasha, charged with the establishment of the Chinese Muslimans, embarked yesterday. The delay in the departure of the mission was due to the opposition of Russia. The scheme is favored by Germany.

Pietro Mascagni, an Italian composer, will tour the United States. He starts Oct. 15 and takes with him an orchestra of 50 members.

A RISING IS FEARED!

Reports That Chinese Are Secretly Combining Confirmed.

Germans Left in Control of Passes Into Shan-Si—Ministers Favor Loan Raised on Powers' Guarantee to Pay Indemnity.

London, May 3.—The reports of the secret combination of disaffected elements in the Yang Tse provinces for purpose of organizing general risings are receiving some confirmation, says the Shanghai correspondent of the Morning Post. "The British consul at Nankin telegraphs Mr. Brennan, the British consul in Shanghai, that the Nankin viceroy is very anxious about the Yang Tse movement, and he asks Mr. Brennan to assist the local to maintain order by sending troops."

It is announced from German sources that the French have withdrawn their troops from Hwan Lu to Pao Ting Fu, thus leaving the Germans in sole possession of all the passes into Shan Si.

THE MATTER OF INDEMNITY.

Dr. Morrison, writing to the Times from Peking, Wednesday, says: "The indemnity committee favors a loan raised on the guarantee of all the powers. Its proposal to increase the maritime customs to 5 per cent ad valorem applies to import duties only, and not to exports. All the ministers of the powers, except the British, American and Japanese, favor an immediate increase to 10 per cent. TOTALS \$25,000,000."

Berlin, May 2.—The statement that the total indemnity to be demanded of China amounts to \$25,000,000 has been officially confirmed here. This amount includes all private claims, and the Chinese government will now undertake to pay this sum in indemnities the evacuation of Pe Chi Li Province to begin immediately.

PENSION BILL PASSED HOUSE.

No Dissenting Voices Against Dr. Borden's Measure.

Queen's Birthday Will Hereafter Be Victoria Day—Provision for Royal Mint.

Ottawa, May 2.—The house this afternoon adopted without a dissenting voice the resolution introduced by Dr. Borden, providing for pensions for the retired staff, the officers and men of the permanent force, and the wives and children of officers. The only criticism offered to the measure was by way of suggesting that the measure be extended in its application, and that more generous treatment be given to the officers. The bill establishing the 24th of May as a public holiday, to be known as Victoria Day, was passed. In supply a number of bills in the public work and railways and canals departments were passed.

In reply to Mr. Monk, Sir Louis Davies stated that the government had accepted the invitation to join in the inquiry in respect to St. Lawrence navigation, which was instituted last year by the Montreal shipping interests and which it is proposed to continue this year.

THE ROYAL MINT.

Ottawa, May 2.—The minister of finance tonight gave notice of a resolution to authorize the annual payment of a sum of money to the total of \$75,000 in any one year for defraying the expenses connected with the maintenance of a branch of the Royal Mint in Canada to begin immediately.

TERRIBLE GALE IN SOUTH DORCHESTER

Several Barns Demolished by the High Wind Storm of Yesterday.

While the rain was descending in torrents in London yesterday a terrific gale swept over South Dorchester and a portion of Yarmouth. It was accompanied by a downpour of rain and much hail. The gale struck a large new barn on a farm of W. and E. Legg, con. 9, South Dorchester, and completely demolished it. The barn had been roofed and sided, and was raised on timbers, the basement walls not yet having been erected.

It is believed that much damage was done throughout the township that has not yet been reported.

Pans, opera glasses, ammonia, sulphuric acid and bottles of evil-smelling and noxious gases, were among the missiles with which the actors of "The Contraband" were pelted by students at Saratoff, Russia.
