HAMILTON'S DEFAULTING LIBRARIAN.

Hamilton, Feb. 11.—No word has been received of Mr. Richard T. Lancefield, the missing librarian and treasurer of the public library board, and there have been few developments in the case since Saturday. The auditor has not made much progress, on account of the books being so badly mutilated. The most important discovery made in the last two days is that the minutes of the board for the last two years have been destroyed. In the eyes of the law this is a more serious offense than stealing, the maximum punishment being 21 years in much at sea as it was at the annual meeting.

UNDERMINED THE BANK. Muskegon, Mich., Feb. 11.—One of the coolest bank robberies ever occurring in this section was discovered yesterday morning, when the big vault of the Muskegon Savings Bank was opened by Cashier Hammond. Amid wreckage near the center of the strong room was a hole which had been bored in the thick cement floor, just large enough to admit of the body of a man. The authorities were notified, and an inventory of the contents of the safety deposit boxes was begun. All that has been found missing is \$329 in bills and old silver coin and a gold watch. The burglars gained entrance to the vault through a tunnel dug beneath the building. The steel doors of the inner vault, where thousands of dollars of the bank's funds lay, were not touched. The work of tunneling must have begun soon after the bank closed Sat-THE WRECKED DETROIT BANK.

Detroit, Mich., Feb. 11 .- The directors of the City Savings Bank yester-day afternoon issued the following statement: In justice to ourselves, our depositors and stockholders, the undersigned directors of the City Savings Bank make the following statement: Early on Saturday morning we learned for the first time that Henry R. Andrews, cashier of the bank, had allowed Frank C. Andrews to overdraw his account in the sum of over \$300,000, and had also, without consideration, certified said Frank C. Andrews' checks for over \$700,000, all of which checks were outstanding. The bank was immediately put into the hands of the banking commissioner, and we set about to get all the security we could. Mr. Frank C. Andrews has turned over to the bank a large amount of securities, from which we hope to pay our depositors in full. The banking commissioner has deemed it the wisest policy to close the bank for the present, for the best interest of all depositors. Outside of the Frank C. Andrews indebtedness and checks, the bank was never in a better condition. The officers of the bank, which was organized in 1889, are: President, Frank C. Pingree; vice-president, Frank C. Andrews; cashier, H. R. Andrews: assistant cashier, Joseph A. Schulte. The capital stock of the bank is \$150,000. According to the statement of the bank's condition, printed Dec. 17, the bank had total deposits of \$3,-
