LORD HOPE'S TROUBLES

Free of May Yohe, He Wants to Wed
His Cousin.

London, Oct. 13.—Father Black, no-
torious as a protestor against the
remarriage of divorced persons in the
church, and who has created many
scenes when such marriages were be-
ing solemnized, is now keeping a care-
ful watch on Lord Francis Hope, whose
divorce from May Yohe was recently
made final, and who has fallen in love
with his cousin Beatrice Bricketts, who
is a pretty girl, 35 years of age, and
who returns his affections and is
anxious to be married in the Church
of England.

Lord Francis Hope's brother, the
Duke of Newcastle, is at present
abroad, but the remarriage of Lord
Francis in the church will place him
in an awkward position, for the rea-
son that the duke has taken a promi-
nent lead against just such cere-
monies and against the church remar-
riage of divorced persons. Even
divorced wives or husbands are still
living. Father Black has already pro-
tested to one clergyman at Hove, a
parish of Brighton, where he heard
the marriage would be solemnized, and
has also written a strong protest to
the Church Times.

The Temiscaming Road.

Ottawa, Oct. 13.—Mr. Russell, en-
gineer for the Government railway to
Temiscaming, states that the road
at a meeting in Toronto on
Saturday decided to lay the railway
with 80-pound rails. He thinks that
the rails will be procured if possible.
The contractor has already started
gangs building roads for sup-
plies for the first section of the line
from North Bay.

Trade Inquiries.

Ottawa, Oct. 13.—Among inquiries
received by the Canadian section of the
Imperial Institute are the following:
A Liverpool house asks to be placed
in correspondence with Canadian
manufacturers of hosiery, turned
legs and other chair stock, and
drawer bottoms. A London firm de-
sires names of Canadian shippers of
soapstone of first-class quality. A
British house in Japan exporting drug-
gists' lines wishes to arrange with a
Canadian firm of good standing to
handle their goods.

Venezuelan Troops Repulsed.

Willemstad, Island of Curacao, Oct.
13.—The troops of the Venezuelan Gov-
ernment have been repulsed while re-
attempting to again occupy Toro
(capital of the State of Falcon), and
sustained heavy losses. A schooner
with 60 men on board was sunk. The
engagement was fought at
Goyabo, three hours from Caracas,
Saturday. The Government force was
defeated, losing 112 men.

Revolutionists have almost complete-
ly encircled Caracas.

The British cruiser Indefatigable ar-
rived at La Guaira Sunday. Other
British vessels are to follow.

The United States gunboat Marietta
has returned to La Guaira from
Caracas.

Thirteen Per Cent Divorced.

Indianapolis, Oct. 13.—The state
statistician has compiled tables show-
ing the relation between marriage and
divorce in Indiana for the year ending
June 30 last and finds that for every
seven marriages license issued there
is one divorce, or that 13 per cent of
the marriages are followed by legal
separations. The totals of the tables
compiled by the statistician are as fol-
lows:

Marriage licenses 26,914
Divorces granted 3,553

The largest increase in divorces, as
compared with the previous year, was
in the Counties of Delaware, Grant
and Madison. The breaking up of the
Gretna-green at Jeffersonville caused
a falling off of more than half in the
marriage licenses issued in Clark
County.

PROSPECTS ARE VERY MUCH BRIGHTER
FOR AN EARLY SETTLEMENT OF STRIKE

Representatives of the Coal Roads Are Now in Confer-
ence at New York City.

Plan Proposes Incorporation
of Miners' Union.

WILL GRANT MINERS' DEMANDS

Operators Disposed to Meet Workers
as Soon as They Are Made a
Responsible Body.

New York, Oct. 13.—A conference
of the representatives of the coal-carry-
ing railroads was held here today,
which, according to one of those pres-
ent, may result in a definite step to-
wards the settlement of the coal strike.
The conference was held in the office
of E. B. Thomas, chairman of the
board of directors of the Erie Railroad,
and was participated in by him and
President Oliphant and Vice-President
Wilcox, of the D. and H.; President
Fowler, of the O. and W., and Presi-
dent Truesdale of the Delaware, Lack-
awanna and Western. As Mr. Trues-
dale entered Mr. Thomas' office he
said, in reply to a question:
"Yes, a conference is to be held, and
it will be an important one. It may
be productive of immediate results in
the situation."

A number of rumors to the effect
that a basis of settlement had been
reached were refuted today, but none
of them could be traced to an authori-
tative source. The following "It was
said today by a person believed to be
in a position to know the facts that
a definite plan for the settlement of
the strike has been suggested to the
operators, and an answer is expected
from them at their usual weekly meet-
ing tomorrow."

"Briefly, the plan is this: The mine
workers' association to be incorpo-
rated, and with a capital that will make
them a responsible body, with which
the operators can make a binding con-
tract as to wages, hours of labor, etc.
The operators will grant their men
the wages and hours demanded, and
a contract to that effect being made
with the incorporated miners' as-
sociation."

VERY FEW RECRUITS.

Presence of Soldiers Has Not Increased the
Number of Workers.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., Oct. 13.—Interest
was centered today in the efforts of
the coal companies to induce men to
return to work under the protection
of the troops. Information from coal
companies is difficult to obtain, but
judging from early reports from vari-
ous sources there are few additional
workers in the mines of this region to-
day. The troops were out early, but
were not called upon to suppress any
disorder.

In some places detachments of troops
were on duty near collieries all night,
and at other points soldiers were scat-
tered in twos and threes along streets
and on street corners.

It was stated at strike headquarters
that there were no desertions from
the ranks of the strikers today, but on
the other hand fewer men were ap-
pearing than last week. President
Mitchell had no news to give. He said
he had heard rumors of a strike settle-
ment, but there was nothing in them
as far as he knew. He is apparently
waiting for news from the other side.

ANOTHER COLLIERY STARTS.

Hazleton, Pa., Oct. 13.—S. Pardee,
Sons & Co. started their Latimer
colliery today with a force of about
125 men. The majority of the laborers
and special officers. Coal mined be-
fore the strike started was run through
the breakers. Companies E and G of

the First Regiment guarded the col-
liery, but no attempt was made by
strikers to interfere with the men at
work.

LAST WEEK'S WORK.

Pottsville, Pa., Oct. 13.—As the re-
sult of last week's mining at the Brook-
side colliery, 35 gondolas containing
over 800 tons were shipped to market
this morning. Good Spring colliery also
made a small shipment, at did Kalmia
washery. All are operated by the
Philadelphia and Reading Company.
None of the troops have been stationed
at any of these points.

The body of Col. Theodore Hoffman,
commander of the Eighth Regiment,
who died suddenly Saturday in Soran-
ton, was brought to his residence in
this city today. A detail of his regi-
ment accompanied the body.

SOMETHING IN THE WIND

President Baer Spent Sunday in New
York City.

New York, Oct. 13.—It was learned
early today that President Baer, of the
Philadelphia and Reading Company,
was called to New York on Sunday,
and that he spent the day in close con-
ference, probably with J. P. Morgan,
over the anthracite coal miners' strike.
What the outcome of the supposed con-
ference will be is a matter of complete
guess work.

The greatest secrecy was thrown
around the movements of President
Baer. He left his home in Reading,
Pa., on a special train at 7 o'clock
Sunday morning and arrived in Jersey
City at 10:30 o'clock. From that mo-
ment until he stepped from a ferryboat
from New York at 11 o'clock in the
evening absolutely nothing certain is
known of his movements. At 11:15
o'clock he boarded a train for Reading
by way of Philadelphia, and is said to
have stated that he did not expect to
be in New York again today.

BAER WILL NOT TALK.

Philadelphia, Oct. 13.—President
Baer, of the Philadelphia and Reading
Company, is at his office in this city
at the usual hour this morning. He

EDITOR SHOTS A DOCTOR

Jealousy Over Woman to Whom Both
Were Devoted the Cause.

Butte, Mont., Oct. 13.—The shooting
of Dr. A. H. Cayley, a prominent re-
sident of Butte, by J. W. Kelly, editor
of the Inter-Mountain, occurred late
Saturday night, but so quiet was the
affair kept that the police did not
hear of it until late last night. Jeal-
ousy over a woman to whom both were
devoted is supposed to have been the
cause. The bullet lodged near the
spinal cord, and completely paralyzed
the left side of the victim. There is
little hope for his recovery. Kelly is
believed to be hiding in the city. Dr.
Cayley is one of the best known phy-
sicians in the city and is married.

DARING AERONAUTS KILLED

Car Fell to Earth From a Great
Height.

Ropes ridding it to Balloon Broke in
Some Unknown Way.

Paris, Oct. 13.—De Bratsky, the aéro-
naut, and a companion were killed by
falling from a balloon this morning. De
Bratsky's balloon started from the aéro-
station at Vaugirard, a suburb of
Paris, at 10 o'clock, and was at a
height of 300 to 400 feet. The two pro-
pellers of the machine appeared to work
well. The rider, however, was not quite
successful. At about 9:20 the balloon
returned to above the point of departure,
and then it gradually mounted higher
and higher until it disappeared in the
clouds. The prefect of police later re-
ceived a dispatch announcing the fall of
the balloon near St. Denis (five and a half
miles from the center of Paris), and ad-
ding that its two occupants were killed.

When the balloon was above St. Denis,
near St. Denis, the ropes attaching the
car to the balloon broke from some un-
known cause, and the car, with its occu-
pants, De Bratsky and Morin, was dashed
to the ground and the aeronauts met
instantaneous death. The balloon itself
disappeared in the clouds.

Sage Will Rest.

New York, Oct. 13.—Reports are cur-
rent, says the Press, that Russell
Sage, the financier, whose health has
been not of the best recently, has de-
cided to curtail, somewhat, his busi-
ness activities at the earnest solici-
tation of his friends. He has, it is
stated, so systematized his vast inter-
ests that they will not require his con-
stant attention, and, although his
health is reported to be steadily im-
proving, he has, it is said, decided to
conserve his strength as much as possi-
ble.
