Monster Demonstrations in Canada and United States

Parade, Greeted with Hoots
and Hisses.

Ottawa had an ideal day for their holiday, and in fact it was made a very general holiday. Nearly all the stores were closed. In the morning about 800 unionists paraded, accompanied by bands and allegorical cars.

Montreal, Sept. 7.—The Labor Day celebration in Montreal was a great success. Splendid weather made the day attractive to thousands of people who took advantage of the general holiday. All the big factories and manufacturing establishments were

closed down, and the noisy parade was held out of town. The workers, with their families, to enjoy the holiday. When the procession was ready to start, the parade grounds were filled with 20,000 men assembled, representing the unions in the city.
