

## The Daily Grist in P. M. Love's Court

Magistrate Love decided this morning to send Thomas Cameron and William Bavin for trial for assaulting a little south end boy a few weeks ago. The two young men will be given a hearing at the December sessions.

### Pleaded Not Guilty.

Jefferson Slight, who was arrested by Detective Nickle a few weeks ago, charged with stealing an overcoat and pair of shoes from Robert Mickleborough, pleaded not guilty, and asked to be tried by a jury. Mr. Mickleborough was called and stated that he had left his overcoat and boots at a local livery barn while he went out. When he returned he found the boots missing and an old overcoat hanging on his hook. Several employees testified that they had seen Slight wearing a coat that answered the description of the missing one on the afternoon in question.

### Sent for Trial.

When Detective Nickle arrested Slight he had no overcoat on and it is supposed he disposed of it to some unknown person.

After hearing the evidence Magistrate Love committed Slight for trial at the December sessions. Slight was

out on suspended sentence on a charge of forcibly entering his wife's house.

### Given 21 Days.

John Clark and Patrick Murray, two of the trio who were celebrating in a Michigan Central box car the other evening, were sent down for 21 days, as they only had 28 cents between them to pay a \$20 fine which was imposed on them. James Malloch, the third man arrested, claims to have a wife and children living in the city, and he was remanded for a week to see if any information can be obtained.

### Charge Dropped.

The charge of breaking a plate glass window at the Southern Company's works, was dropped, as there was no evidence against the men.

### Came From Mitchell.

Harry Maher, a young man from Mitchell, said he guessed he was a vagrant. He came here to look for work, but had been unsuccessful in obtaining any. He was remanded for a week.

The two boys who were charged in the juvenile court yesterday morning with stealing a horse, were acquitted, as the matter has been satisfactorily arranged.

## MILK, BREAD, FUEL IS GOING UP

Ottawa, Oct. 24.—The Labor Gazette says that as a result of the high price of hay and other fodder, the price of milk will advance at a number of points throughout Canada. At Montreal 10 cents per quart were asked, and in several other localities the price is higher than ever before reported. Coal advanced by 25 to 50 cents per ton at several points. Flour

and bread were upward. It is estimated that in the city of Montreal alone an additional expenditure of over \$400,000 will be entailed by the advance in bread, milk and fuel during the coming winter season, bread being one cent more per loaf, coal 25 cents more per ton, and milk three cents per quart more than at the same period in 1906.

## Chairman Darch Says He's Satisfied

"I am sorry that the Komoka by-law was not submitted before," said Chairman Darch of the water commission to The Advertiser this morning. "We had thought that it would be ready for the people by the first of November but many delays, perhaps unavoidable, have happened that have made it impossible to do so. The time is so near January that it is just as well, perhaps, to let it go until the municipal elections. There is only one objection that I have, and it is this: At the January election there will be probably a number of by-laws submitted and the Komoka by-law will not be given the attention it deserves. Still

the people have taken considerable interest in the water question, and maybe a good vote will be taken on it."

"If the by-law carries, will you be able to increase the supply to prevent any shortage next summer," was asked.

"Oh, yes. If the by-law carries we will take quick action," Mr. Darch said. "There may be some difficulty in getting the supplies we want, but I think that can be overcome. In case it is defeated we will also take quick action and submit some other scheme for the consideration of the electorate."

## Labor Meeting in City Hall Tonight

The Labor campaign goes on apace, the active canvass instituted the other day still continuing. Many well-known manufacturers were visited to-day. Mr. Allan Studholme and Mr. Verville addressing meetings at Whites' the cigar factories, the rolling mills, and other places.

Mr. Jacoby is making a personal canvass himself.

The meeting tonight in the city hall promises to be interesting.

Mr. W. F. Maclean, the publisher, of the Toronto World, and the member

for South York in the House of Commons, is coming to speak on behalf of Mr. Jacoby. He is the prime mover in the public ownership campaign, and will probably devote most of his time to that feature of the campaign. He will also deal with the railroad situation in Canada.

Mr. W. H. Greenwood, managing editor of the World, is in the city also, and will be present at tonight's meeting, and will perhaps take part in it. Mr. Verville, M. P., and Mr. Allan Studholme will also take part in the meeting.

## THE PRICES OF FRUIT GOING UP

Misguided Londoners, who figured that fruit and nuts at least would not increase in price as have other holiday requisites, will be very much disappointed when they start to do their holiday buying, according to a prominent fruit dealer.

Oranges, especially, will be up in price, chiefly on account of the lateness of the Florida crops, which are at least three weeks later this year than last. The wholesale prices this year will range from 15 to 50 cents a box higher than heretofore, according to the value and quality of the fruit.

Sweet chestnuts will be as high as the balloons turned loose in St. Louis

recently, on account of the great scarcity of the yield.

English walnuts, too, will be away above par for the same reason, while California raisins will sell above par because the crops are late this year, and there is a great demand for the fruit.

Grape fruit will go up somewhat, as also will bananas.

There is still some hope, however, for the lovers of fruit who are only possessed of moderate means, for lemons and Spanish raisins it is said will be cheaper than they were a year ago.

One will also be able to procure almonds at a lower rate, while hickory nuts, on a par with the prices of last holiday-time.

The petition is on behalf of George A. Hall, a brother-in-law of Mrs. Hall. Mrs. Hall was an old resident of this city, and eighteen years ago was committed to the asylum suffering from insanity. She is now 71 years of age. She is the widow of the late Richard Hall.

## TAX RATE FIGURES OF MUCH INTEREST

Rates of Toronto and London and Other Cities Compared.

The Toronto assessment department has issued a comparative statement of the assessment of several American and Canadian cities.

The tax rate of Toronto is 18.5-10 mills; Buffalo, 19.22-100 mills; Detroit, 15.46-100 mills; Cleveland, 21.2-100 mills, and Rochester, 19.31-100 mills.

These cities are in about the same class at Toronto, and show that Canada occupies a rather good position in comparison.

The tax rate of the Canadian cities is shown to be as follows: Toronto, 5-10; Ottawa, 23.1-10; London, 21.5-10; Kingston, 29 mills; St. Catharines, 22 mills, and St. Thomas 21.5-10 mills.

### "Macbeth" at the Grand.

The fair-sized audience at the Grand last night was most appreciative of the performance of "Macbeth," by the Grand Opera Company, but they had a grievance against Mr. Greet himself in shirking the title role and intrusting to an actor who had very imperfectly memorized his part.

Macbeth stumbled and the audience prompted him to continue, what was otherwise an excellent and well-rounded production. The roles of Lady Macbeth and Macduff were exceptionally well taken. Mr. Greet contented himself with playing the drunken porter, who was on the stage less than five minutes.

### At Osgoode Hall.

Morrison vs. Sinclair.—R. S. Robertson (Stratford), for defendant, appealed from judgment of MacMahon, J., dated June 29, 1907, finding for the plaintiff in a check for \$812. Defendant alleged that check was given without consideration, and upon condition that a good title would be given to plaintiff to a certain mining claim near Cobalt. After giving the check defendant went to the office of the recorder at Cobalt, and discovered there was a cloud upon the title in the way of an appeal against the title of the plaintiff. Defendant thereupon instructed the bank to refuse payment of the check. Defendant counter-claimed for his costs in defending his title. J. M. Ferguson, for plaintiff; appeal. Appeal dismissed with costs.

### SHOE WORKERS' STRIKE

Toronto Factory Employees Refuse to Stand for Decrease in Wages.

Toronto, Oct. 23.—Eighty boot and shoe workers employed at the Victoria Shoe factory, owned by Thomas Pepper, went out on strike this morning because the management proposed a decrease in their wages of 15 per cent. The average wage is \$12 per week. The defense given by the management is that improved machinery was placed in the factory when it was taken over by the present management and more sanitary conditions created, and that in view of the fact that more money can be made than under the old condition of affairs, the reduction was justified. The cutters, for instance, made \$8 per week under the old system, and are now making a little over \$10 per week. The shoe workers have declined to have the matter submitted to a board of arbitration, and will fight to a finish.

### A TRIPLE TRAGEDY

Elopement Causes Death of Two and Fatal Wounding of Third.

Cleveland, Ohio, Oct. 23.—What will result in a triple tragedy was enacted in a house on Buckeye road in the southeastern part of the city last night.

Two men are dead and the wife of one of them is fatally hurt. The murderer, after shooting the other two, turned the weapon upon himself.

The slayer was Michael Szekely, 24 years old, who recently came here from Buffalo, and other parties to the tragedy were Ermine Bump, 21 years old, and his wife. The hospital officials say the woman is dying. She told them that she eloped with Szekely some time ago, and lived with him in a small town near Buffalo, but had deserted

## BOURNE TO BE A CARDINAL

Pope Will Elevate Archbishop of Westminster at December Consistory.

London, Oct. 23.—A dispatch from Rome to the Exchange Telegraph Company states that the Pope will hold a consistory in December, at which the Right Rev. Francis Bourne, Archbishop of Westminster, will be raised to the cardinalate.

Mgr. Bourne has been Archbishop of Westminster since 1903. He was born in London March 23, 1861, and received his education in England and France. He was ordained to the priesthood in 1884, appointed rector of Southwark Diocesan Seminary in 1889, named domestic prelate to Pope Leo XIII. in 1895, appointed titular bishop of Hippiana and coadjutor to the Bishop of Southwark in 1896, and was Bishop of Southwark from 1897 till his appointment to Westminster.

## EMPEROR CONVALESCENT

Vienna, Oct. 24.—The physicians in attendance on Emperor Francis Joseph this morning announced for the first time since his majesty has been confined, that the convalescence state of his illness has begun. His sleep last night was undisturbed by coughing, and the catarrhal symptoms are improving. Preparations are going on to permit the Emperor to take a walk in the garden in the event of his improvement continuing and the weather being favorable.

## STOCK PRICES

### SHOOTING UP

Efforts to Relieve Wall Street Situation Have a Good Effect.

New York, Oct. 24.—Wall Street, 10:10 a.m.—Prices of stocks shot up buoyantly in the opening dealings, as an expression of relief over the measures taken to fortify the financial position. Early advances in London heralded the recovery here. Westinghouse Electric rebounded 10 points from yesterday's closing, and then reacted 5; B. and O. jumped 2 1/2; General Electric 2 1/2; Union Pacific, Southern Pacific, Canadian Pacific and Atchafalpa 2; Great Northern (preferred), 1 1/2; St. Paul and American Smelting 1 1/2.

New York, Oct. 24.—When the London prices were received there was a feeling of relief that indications of foreign liquidation had stopped, and in view of somewhat more favorable news, which appeared in this morning's papers, the expectation was that higher prices might be looked for. This improvement in sentiment was largely due to the announcement of the suspension of two small up-town banks. The advances shared at the opening quickly dissipated, and the market was left with a list of active stocks the lowest price for a long time was recorded. Doubtless, there has been selling out of loans and the buying power has been disappointing. London houses have probably purchased some 30,000 shares. The money market opened late and the first loans were at 50 per cent. Subsequently the City Bank put out blocks of \$50,000 at 6 per cent, but the demands were by no means met. There is still a large crowd at the money exchange, and the money market is well-informed banking quarters. It is asserted that money will be more plentiful than yesterday, and that borrowers with satisfactory collateral will receive required amounts. Sales to noon were 507,500 shares.
