 LONDON LIBERALS AND THE
 ELECTION.

The Liberals of the city have three
 choices on election day: they may
 vote for Mr. Beattie; they may vote
 for Mr. McCandless; they may vote
 for neither.

The attitude of the Liberals is of
 far more consequence on this occa-
 sion than it was in the by-election
 of last year. The latter contest had no
 bearing upon the fortunes of the Gov-
 ernment. With its majority of 70, a
 seat more or less was of no account.
 In the present election a vote for Mr.
 Beattie is a direct vote against the
 Government, at a time when its fate
 is at stake. No friend of the admin-
 istration, no admirer of Sir Wilfrid
 Laurier, can consistently vote for a
 candidate of the Opposition, especially
 an Opposition whose only weapon
 is slander.

Liberals who are debating the other
 alternatives should bear in mind that
 a Liberal vote unpollled has almost
 the same effect as a vote polled for
 Mr. Beattie. A vote for Mr. Mc-
 Candless, although not a vote for the
 Laurier Government, is a vote against
 the candidate of an Opposition which
 has merited the resentment of Liberals
 by its reckless and mendacious "scand-
 al" campaign. The Liberals of Lon-
 don can at least protest at the polls
 against this policy of insult.

Those who may object to support-
 ing a Labor candidate because they
 do not agree with all that he advo-
 cates, or because they think he rep-
 resents exclusively the interests of a
 class which is not their own, need
 have no fears. Mr. McCandless is not
 a Revolutionist, and even if he were
 he would be harmless in the House
 of Commons where there are not likely
 to be more than three or four mem-
 bers unconnected with the regular
 parties. His reputation is that of an
 honest, intelligent and industrious
 workman, not violent or extreme
 in his opinions or his language, or
 fond of making a noise. While the
 Liberals can exact no pledges from
 him, he would in any event support
 Government measures which he be-
 lieved to be right, which is more than
 can be said of any Opposition candi-
 date. Mr. Verville, the Labor mem-
 ber for Montreal, says that Sir
 Wilfrid Laurier was in the habit of
 consulting him upon industrial leg-
 islation, and acknowledged that the
 advice of Labor members in the
 House had been of use and value in
 framing many measures. Altogether,
 the logical course for London Liber-
 als in the present situation is to vote
 for the Labor nominee.

A FRAUD EXPOSED.
 A barefaced fraud in the campaign
 hand-book of the Opposition was ex-
 posed the other day by Sir Richard
 Cartwright. As minister of trade and
 commerce he was particularly inter-
 ested in the trade statistics published
 by the opponents of the Government.
 He was somewhat startled when his
 eye alighted on the following para-
 graph:

"Mexico imported in 1936 \$42,000,000. In 1935 it imported \$221,000,000, being a fivefold increase within a period of ten years. It exported \$105,000,000 in 1936, and in 1935 exported \$271,000,000."

The inference was that Mexico's
 trade had grown almost as rapidly as
 Canada's. Sir Richard was puzzled for
 a time, but finally a light broke upon
 him. Until recently Mexico's currency
 was on a silver basis, the Mexican sil-
 ver dollar being worth just 49 cents in
 gold. The tricky author of the Opposi-
 tion pamphlet, which was falsely
 labelled "Facts for Electors," had stat-
 ed the import trade of Mexico in 1936
 in gold values, 100 cents to the dollar,
 while the 1935 values were given in
 silver values, 49 cents to the dollar.
 Assuming for convenience that the
 Mexican silver dollar is worth 50 cents,
 the comparison of Canada's trade with
 Mexico's would be:

Canada	\$218,000,000	\$330,000,000
Mexico	\$94,500,000	\$240,000,000

The object of the fraud was to dis-
 parage and depreciate the growth and
 progress of Canada. What a patriotic
 production!

THE EYE-OPENER.

The Calgary News exposes a con-
 spiracy to publish an election issue of
 "The Eye-Opener," which would con-
 tain "oceans of filth," and be distrib-
 uted throughout Canada by tens of
 thousands. The intention was to bring
 out this issue some days before the
 election, so that it would find its way
 to the remotest corners of the coun-
 try. The system was begun in the
 Colchester by-election last year.

While the News acquits decent Con-

servatives of any part in the conspir-
 acy, or with approving of the publi-
 cation of such a sheet as the Eye-
 Opener, it says there is a faction be-
 hind the dirty work. It names one
 prominent party boss, who, it says,
 visited the East to arrange for street
 sales of the filthy publication.

The attack of the News upon the
 Eye-Opener created in the west an in-
 terest that overshadowed the election
 campaign for the time being. The
 article which made the sensation was
 the first of a series, but the publication
 of the remainder has been temporarily
 stopped by an action for libel against
 Mr. McGillivuddy, of the News. The
 latter, however, says he will not be de-
 terred from fully exposing the men
 responsible for the publication of the
 Eye-Opener, and from driving it out
 of existence. He has performed a
 public service.

A WET CAMPAIGN IN WINNIPEG

The campaign in Winnipeg is warm
 but not dry. Says the Winnipeg Free
 Press:

"Enormous quantities of beer,
 bologna sausage, cheese and crack-
 ers were used by the Conservative
 workers at Edward Hall Monday
 night, when what was easily the
 most disgraceful scene that has oc-
 curred in a Winnipeg election cam-
 paign occurred in connection with
 a rally in the interests of Alex-
 ander Hagart, K. C., Conservative
 candidate in Winnipeg and chief
 liquor license commissioner for the
 province of Manitoba. At the close
 of the speech-making in the main
 portion of the hall hundreds of men
 crowded down to what was openly
 called 'the bar,' which was presided
 over by six professional bartenders.
 Scores of cases of outright drunken-
 ness occurred as a result of the
 celebration while Conservative work-
 ers today maintain that many votes
 were made for Hagart."

The Opposition managers in Win-
 nipeg are not discreet. A public hall
 is no place for such an orgie. A
 more effective plan would have been
 that adopted in this city in 1896, when
 the attic of the Conservative head-
 quarters was turned into a barroom
 with a free lunch attachment, and
 sleeping accommodation provided for
 those who had imbibed not wisely but
 too well. The hospitality of the hosts
 was so overpowering that men who
 were suspected of unorthodoxy at the
 polls were detained by physical force.
 There was not only a free lunch, but
 a free fight, and free medical atten-
 dance for the injured. The Winnipeg
 politicians are amateurs by compari-
 son.

Borden and Foster. It's Borden's
 fault if the names are linked.

There are a good many Conservatives
 who can't stomach Mr. Borden's Foster-
 brother.

Mr. Beck will keep off Mr. Beattie's
 platform, as he kept off Mr. Gray's.
 He is too astute to spoil his own
 game.

However, it isn't likely that Mr. Peter
 Elson will return his indemnity because
 of the attack of his organ on the
 "salary grab."

The Opposition candidate in South
 Toronto says he believes that Sir Wil-
 frid Laurier "would justify the devil
 and all his works." The devil will have
 no fault to find with politicians who
 use such language.

Our local contemporary has changed
 its campaign slogan. In 1935 it was
 "A vote for Hyman is a vote for Laur-
 er, Sbarretti and the Hierarchy!" Now
 it is "Turn the Rascals Out!" Our
 contemporary is never violent or vin-
 dictive.

It is not likely that Mr. W. F. Mac-
 lean would respond to an invitation to
 take the stump against Mr. Beattie
 once more. Mr. Maclean prates of his
 independence between elections, but he
 wears the party collar meekly enough
 when the fight is on.

Mr. Beck, Mr. Elson, Mr. Neely and
 Mr. Perrin addressed a meeting at Dor-
 chester last night. Mr. Perrin is quoted
 as saying:

"On his campaign tour Sir Wilfrid
 Laurier says trade has advanced un-
 der Liberal rule. It has in a way.
 But I ask you if you were merchants
 would you rather sell more or buy
 more? Under Sir John A. Macdonald
 Canada sold more than she bought.
 Now trade has increased, but more
 goods are bought from other coun-
 tries and brought into Canada than
 are purchased by other countries from
 Canada. The balance of trade is now
 against Canada."

Perhaps this is not an accurate report
 of what he said. The other speakers
 probably never in their lives looked in-
 to a text-book on economics, but Mr.
 Perrin is a votary of "the dismal sci-
 ence" and knows that the "favorable
 balance of trade" theory is an exploded
 fallacy and that the argument at-
 tributed to him is ridiculous. Leave
 that to the chaps who don't know
 better, Finley.

WHY HE WAS NOT PRESENTED TO THE KING.

The mayor of Doncaster (Mr. Alderman
 J. F. Clark) has published correspondence
 explaining why he was not presented
 when the King attended the races in
 that town. He received a telegram from
 Mr. L. V. Harcourt, M.P., who was at
 the Abbey with the King, in the fol-
 lowing terms: "I wish to present you
 to the King today, if you will meet me at
 foot of hill leading to royal box, imme-
 diately after Lezer race today."

To this the mayor replied by a telegram
 saying he much regretted he was unable

to avail himself of the honor so kindly
 offered, following this by an explanatory
 letter, in the course of which he said:
 "It would, indeed, have been a great
 honor, which I should have looked back
 upon all my life with the greatest grati-
 fication, as I have a profound respect and
 regard for our most Gracious King, whom
 I desire to honor in every way as one of
 his most loyal subjects. Though I have
 lived in Doncaster all my life I have never
 once attended the races, and did not,
 therefore, feel that I could consistently
 break through the rule even for so great
 an honor."

MACKAY EXPLODES SCANDALS BEFORE SOUTH HURON ELECTORS

Leader of Ontario Opposition and Candidate Pack Exeter Town Hall—Western Ontario Liberal Ridings Certain of Victory and Holding Own Elsewhere.

Hon. A. G. MacKay addressed a large meeting of the electors of South Huron, at Exeter last evening. The town hall was filled to capacity, and the audience heard a masterly speech by the leader of the Ontario Opposi-
 tion, Mr. MacKay, dealing in striking manner with the scandal "charges" alleged by the Conservatives.

He was particularly impressive in dealing with the so-called timber deals. These charges were founda-
 tionless in every respect. All the timber sold by the Laurier adminis-
 tration was sold under and in every instance the highest bidder received the limit. In every case it was advertised thoroughly. The Lib-
 erals even with this policy alienated but 6,000 square miles in twelve years. In the eighteen years of Conservative rule over 23,000 square miles had been disposed of and in one year 10,000 miles were given away abso-
 lutely by the Conservatives for which they received not one cent. That was more than the Liberals sold in all their term of office. The Conserva-
 tives received but \$4 12 a mile, while the Liberals received \$31 32 with a stumpage tax of 25 cents per 1,000 feet and \$5 per mile rental. The Con-
 servatives received not more than half the sum per mile that Hon. Alex. McKenzie received, although the values had increased greatly.

THE ROSS RIFLE.

Mr. MacKay dealt effectively with the Ross rifle "scandal." During part of the session the Conservatives had made much of this matter, but Col. Sam Hughes, one of their own mem-
 bers, rebuked their tactics, and as a result they have not mentioned the matter very much during the cam-
 paign, because they know that there is nothing in it whatever. It hap-
 pened at the time to be a fine thing on which to hang insinuations. At Owen Sound the other day in a rifle contest, twenty-seventy of twenty-nine marksmen of their own free choice, selected the Ross rifle above all others. They were not Liberals and Conservatives, but marksmen who wanted the best rifle they could get.

HODGINS' CHARGES.

The Hodgins charges were not used much now by the Conservatives, al-
 though during the session they were used with untold glee. When the whole thing was sifted to the bot-
 tom it was discovered that there was nothing whatever in them, and Major Hodgins was compelled to admit that he was mistaken.

The Robbins irrigation scheme showed clearly the tactics of the Op-
 position. In Ontario and in Manitoba this transaction was held up as an-
 other example of Liberal graft, and the leaders of the party talked glibly of scandal and robbery and all the rest of it. When Mr. Borden and his lieutenants reached Medicine Hat where the details of the whole transac-
 tion were known and where he was within a stone's throw of the celebrated irrigation scheme, he did not mention the matter at all. He thought it wise to talk about something else. In the place where the transaction was best known he was dumb. However, the Conservatives of Medicine Hat knew the deal was a good one, and Mr. Borden's speech on this transaction having been read in that locality they determined to off-set the moving tide of public opinion against the Conserva-
 tives, and their candidate came out boldly in defence of his leader and said the transaction was a proper one, and in the interests of the West.

"If the deal was a scandal in Onta-
 rio, why did not Mr. Borden consider it a scandal in Medicine Hat?" asked Mr. MacKay. "There was no scandal in connection with it, what-
 ever, and Mr. Borden knew it full well."

THE CANDIDATE.

Mr. M. Y. McLean, the Liberal candi-
 date, followed, and made a strong address. He gave a resume of the history of the Laurier administration and pointed out its advantages to the people of Canada. He warned the electors against turning out a Govern-
 ment which had done so well for them. Mr. McLean was given an ex-
 cellent hearing, and has improved his position considerably in Exeter.

Mr. Harry Quinn, president of the Exeter Reform Association, presided.

NORTH OXFORD MEETINGS.

No less than three meetings were

held in North Oxford last night in be-
 half of Mr. E. W. Nesbitt, the Liberal candidate. All were largely attended, and enthusiastic. Fine addresses were delivered by the candidate and several well known local Liberals. Mr. Nes-
 bitt is gaining strength, and it is now merely a question of majority.

HOLMES' PROSPECTS BRIGHT.

Mr. Robert Holmes has an adverse majority of only 93 to contend with, and there are many indications that he will pull that down. In 1904, the Lib-
 erals were too confident of the re-
 sult, and were not organized as they should have been. They are taking nothing for granted this year, but are working with a will. Reports are all very favorable from every section. The Conservative candidate is having con-
 siderable difficulty with Goderich Township, his following there giving every indication of being badly divid-
 ed. There is no doubt that West Huron will make a better showing than in 1904.

HOLDING HIS OWN.

The chances are that the Liberals will more than hold their own in Western Ontario. So far as can be learned there are few Liberal ridings in which there is any doubt as to the result. The two Essex constituencies will return the present Liberal mem-
 bers, East Kent is certainly Liberal, and West Kent will undoubtedly be redeemed by Archie McCoig. West Lambton is solid for Mr. Pardee, while Dr. Fairbank is said to have a fighting chance in East Lambton. In the Mid-
 dlesexes, Mr. W. S. Calvert will hold his seat in the west riding, while Mr. Alex. Smith will undoubtedly win in the north. In the east, Dr. Routledge has a fine chance of election. The Liberals will win two of the three seats in Huron, thus gaining a seat. The two Oxford constituencies will be loyal to Liberalism. In the Elgins, Mr. Tolmie in the west, has a large ad-
 verse majority to pull down, but he is hopeful. In the east riding, Mr. W. W. Rutherford, the Liberal candidate, is making ground every day, and has an excellent chance of taking the seat. The reported slump in Liberal senti-
 ment has not yet been noticed in Western Ontario.

IN THE HURONS.

As the campaign continues, the in-
 dications become more pronounced that the Liberals will retain South Huron, which was reclaimed at the by-election in January last. On every hand the Liberal candidate is receiv-
 ing the heartiest response, and the united and warmest endeavors of the party. There is every reason to be-
 lieve that South Huron will remain true to the Liberal cause, but while such is the case, this object can only be attained by continued and con-
 scientious work. A little indifference or over-sanguineness has often turn-
 ed an assured victory into defeat. It behooves every Liberal in the riding, therefore, to put forth every effort, to work, and work with a will, until the last vote is polled. If this is done we will have the satisfaction on the night of the 25th of again being represented in the Liberal column. The Lib-
 erals have a good cause and an able leader to work for, and this should inspire them to the utmost zeal. Then, leave nothing legitimate undone to see that every vote is polled on Oct. 26, and the victory is ours.—Huron Ex-
 positor.

The majority in favor of the Con-
 servative candidate in East Huron in 1904 was 184. At that time the Lib-
 eral party did not show its full strength, and as a result the Liberals were defeated. Since then, Mr. Arch Hislop has been working hard, and as a result the Liberals will put a solid front to the enemy. This means that the Liberal choice will be elected by a handsome majority. Mr. Hislop is most enthusiastic and hopeful, and backed by a united and well-organ-
 ized party, there is no doubt but that he will roll up a fine majority.

MEETING AT ALLISA CRAIG.

Col. Thompson, ex-M.P., Ottawa, will assist Mr. Alex. Smith, the Liberal candidate, at the nomination meeting in Allisa Craig on Monday afternoon. He is an able debater and will undoubt-
 edly make a good impression. Mr. Smith continues to do fine work, and from all parts of his riding come the most encouraging reports. His election

is assured. However, nothing is being taken for granted, and every available Liberal vote will be polled on election day.

Rally at Ingersoll.

Another characteristic rally was held by the Liberals in the committee rooms Thursday evening. Over 100 Ingersoll representatives crowded the rooms and were delighted with a carefully-ar-
 ranged programme in the hands of Col. Hegler, who acted as chairman. The political questions of the day were ably discussed by Messrs. Geo. F. Jones, Dr. Rogers, Mayor Sutherland and Jas. Ferguson. The speakers were all highly commendatory in their remarks pertaining to the Liberal admin-
 istration under the careful guidance of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Instrumental solos were given by Mr. Comiskey and vocal renditions by Messrs. Davis, Chapman and Burch. A reading was contributed by Robt. Moyer—Ingersoll Sentinel.

Compton Routed.

Mr. W. W. Rutherford, the Liberal candidate, held a splendid meeting in Skelkings school house Thursday evening. Strong addresses were delivered by the candidate, Dr. Sinclair, Aymer; Dan McIntyre, Yarmouth, and W. Dur-
 key. Mr. Ed. Compton, a Conservative speaker from St. Thomas, was present and spoke for some time. He left many openings for the Liberal speakers, and the meeting ended in a complete rout for the Tory campaign. Last evening another fine meeting was held in Sparta, where Mr. Rutherford and Dr. Sinclair and others were greeted by large crowds. The feeling in Yarmouth is strong for the Liberal cause, and it is now thought that the normal Liberal majority will be largely increased owing to the large number of dissatisfied Conservatives who are opposed to the farmers being saddled with a repre-
 sentatives of the combines. The candidature of Mr. Rutherford is growing in favor daily, and it would not be at all surprising if he had a good major-
 ity in the riding.

 terest is being shown in the visit of the leader of the Ontario Opposition, and he is certain of a good audience. East Lambton was one of the few rid-
 ings reclaimed by the Liberals at the last Provincial elections, and it is quite probable that it will again be won by the son of the man who cap-
