GRAND TRUNK CONTEMPLATES

Canada News Company for the Railway Purchases by the corporation was a resident of the Grand Central Hotel, Corner of King and Ridout Streets, from W. H. Mahon-Consideration Was \$25,000.

One of the most important transactions from the viewpoint of the negotlations between the Grand Trunk and the city, was consummated yesterday, when Mr. T. P. Phelan, of Toronto, head of the Canada News Company, purchased the Grand Central Hotel, corner of King and Ridout streets, from Mr. W. H. Mahon, the proprietor.

The consideration was \$25,000. Mr. Phelan will take over the hotel at once, or, at least, as soon as the license can be transferred. There is not likely to be any difficulty on this gineer Graydon's office, no less than

The hotel was bought for the express purpose of giving the company a license in the city.

The license will be transferred to a hotel, it is said, in connection with the new Grand Trunk station, to be erected in this city.
