THE PEARSON PLOT SCARED WALL STREET

Until Unearthed the Speculators Feared Country's Credit Involved.

New York, July 31.-The important financial and railroad news which became known last week went far to explain the recent turmoil and unsettlement in the stock market, and served at the same time to relieve it by a settlement of a threatening situation. The surrender to international syndicate headed by Kuhn, Loeb & Co., of holdings accumulated by the so-called Pearson syndicate, looking into the formation of a railroad combination, reaching from the Atlantic to the Pacific, transformed the speculative position. The transaction, in its first, bearing, relieved the stock market of any necessity for forced liquidation, such as the Tuesday stock market gave an example of. The selling out of loans to the hard-pressed holders of the stocks designed to form the combination, threw the market into demoralization on that day. An excited rise in price of corn caused the apprehension that prospective partial failure of that crop and fears for the country's general credit position, were involved in the acute depression of the stock market. With the disclosure of the immediate cause of the action of the stock market, the part attributed to general causes in the depression was less

While the trouble which overtook the Pearson project might be traced primarily to the market, depdession growing out of general causes, it was recognized that probably it was much aggravated by the attitude of groups whose interests were likely to be impaired by the proposed protective measures in the stock market for some time past, was explained by the unwillingness of these opposing interests to afford support for the extrication of the embarrassed party. The moment chosen for the relief of the perilous stock market situation was the moment of surrender of the aggressive new projectors in the railroad world. The antagonism involved lay not only in the railroad field, but in the industrial field, as well touching some of the most powerful financial

interests in existence. The perception of these facts fostered a conviction that the settlement covered not only a relief of the immediate pressure on the stock market of the embarrassed holdings, but removed also a cause for the reluctance to afford the usual support for market values by powerful inside interests, which have been ominously manifest in the stock market.
