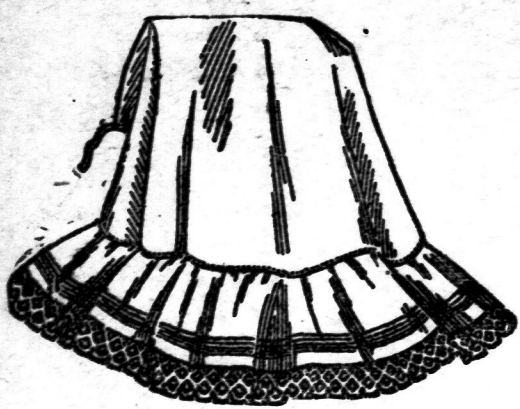

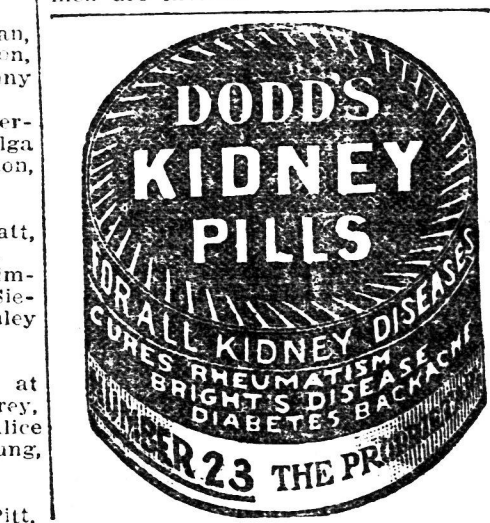
REFUSE TO LEAVE

Windsor, June 28.—Lured on by the fabulous stories of untold wealth to be gained for the asking in the Cobalt district, the three Russians—Jake Kausma, John and Fred Diniluk, who were apprehended by the immigration authorities while attempting to enter Windsor, on Monday, refuse to accept the finding of the officials that they must return to the United States, and are still in the Windsor jail.

For refusing to obey the officers and return to the United States, the men were fined \$6 or 21 days in the jail. They refused to return, and were locked up. According to the Canadian law in this case, the men are liable to two years' imprisonment for not obeying the law.
