A move is on foot to have an immigration office placed in London in order to assist farmers in this district in solving the hired help problem. The matter will brought up in the House shortly and wilf. It is stated, be supported by memoers from surrounding constituencies, who have been urged to support it by farmers all through South-Western On-
