**BUTCHER WANTS STALL
IN SANITARY CONDITION**
Otherwise Rent Should Be Re-
duced He Tells the
Committee.

Owing to the absence of Ald. Murphy
and Ald. Wright, chairman of No. 3 com-
mittee, it was impossible to secure a
quorum at the regular meeting called
for Wednesday evening, and as a result,
merely routine business was transacted.
The former recommendations of the
committee that the fine for infringement
of the bread act be raised from \$5 to
\$50, and that a bylaw be introduced, pro-
viding for the compulsory weighing of all
coal sold by dealers on the city scales,
were laid over for further consideration.
Mr. J. A. Anderson, a tenant in the
market house, asked the committee either
to put his stall in a sanitary condition
or reduce the rent. The city engineer
will report on the cost.
On the suggestion of Ald. Ashplant, it
was decided to recommend that the
basement of the market house be white-
washed.
Tenders will be called for a furnace
for No. 3 fire hall in South London, the
present one being out of commission.
Those present were Ald. Ashplant, acting
chairman; Ald. Rose, Mayor Graham,
Fire Chief Aitken, Market Clerk
Maker, Inspector McCallum, Building
Inspector Piper and Secretary S. Baker.

U. S. CONSUL SUICIDES.
Teneriffe, Canary Islands, Oct. 17.—
William Whitney Kitchen, United
States consul at La Laguna, committed
suicide last night by shooting him-
self with a revolver. He was a suffer-
er from chronic heart disease.
He was a Canadian by birth, having
been born in Toronto, Ont., on April
6, 1875, but he was naturalized in Bu-
falo in 1908. He was appointed to his
post in Teneriffe on March 2 of last
year.

**MIDDLESEX COUNTY
IS EASILY WORTH
\$1,000 PER ACRE**
Agricultural Expert Says It
Cannot Be Surpassed for
Fruit Growing.

**GROWERS ORGANIZE
CO-OPERATIVE SOCIETY**
No Part of the Dominion Can
Be Made More Profitable
Than This District.

A representative meeting of local
fruit growers was held at the home of
S. D. Dawson, Woodbank, on Tuesday
evening, and a Co-operative Associa-
tion was formed. That Middlesex would
be a banner county for fruit produc-
tion was the unanimous verdict of all,
and the convincing testimony given by
various growers of what had already
been accomplished, strongly supported
this prophecy.

Professor I. B. Whaley, agricultural
representative of Middlesex County,
was present, and made a fine speech.
Fruit growers, he said, in Middlesex
County, need a corporate association.
Whatever the individual grower can
accomplish alone, he can only reap the
maximum of profitable crop produc-
tion and financial recompense for his
labors by combining with his fellow
growers. He had travelled all over
the county, and found that for apple,
pears, plums and small fruits, it could
not be surpassed anywhere in the Do-
minion.

He predicted that land would be
worth \$1,000 per acre in the near fu-
ture, as it was in all the chief fruit-
growing counties. He advised the
growers to stick together, and a great
future was certain. Quality should be
their aim, for it was the only way to
build up a solid business.

The following officers were elected:
President, S. D. Dawson; vice-presi-
dent, Mr. Elyea; manager, J. Shar-
man; secretary, W. Bartlett, jun., of
Woodbank; treasurer, H. Shore.
It was decided to adopt the name of
the Middlesex Fruit-Growers' Asso-
ciation, and the next meeting to be
held on Saturday, Oct. 19, at Professor
Whaley's office on King street.

**RECORD-BREAKING TRAFFIC
ON THE LAKES THIS SEASON**

Every Available Craft Is Being Used to Handle the
Tremendous Business—Sarnia and Point Edward
Booming—Brass Company To Build Dwellings.

Sarnia, Oct. 17.—It is an unusual
sight this fall to see a boat of any
considerable tonnage lying idle at the
docks, and the same condition prevails
all over the lakes. Vessels of all
kinds and sizes have been pressed into
service to meet the enormous demands
of waterway transportation, which is
greater this season than it has been
for many years.
Ships that have lain abandoned at
wharfs and anchorage, others that
have rested on the bottom along the
shores of the river, have been hauled
forth by their eager owners, repaired,
rebuilt and placed in commission again
to handle the ever-increasing traffic.

Those of the older generation can
stand on the river bank these days and
see going by every day boats with
which they were familiar years ago
and perhaps sailed on, antiquated old
steamers strange to the eyes of their
children.
There are many who prophesy that
wrecks will be plentiful on the lakes
before navigation closes because of the
number of old-timers that have been
resurrected to meet the demands of
the shippers in the Northwest, but de-
spite their years the old wooden ves-
sels can hold their own in a storm as
well as many of the modern steel
monsters.

Boom Point Edward.
The new buildings to be erected at
Point Edward by the Northern Navi-
gation Company will mean quite a lit-
tle boom for the village, and it is pre-
dicted by real estate men that land
values there will increase considerably.
The laundry which is to be of rein-
forced concrete, 50 by 100 feet, will give
employment to about 35 people.

The plant will take the place of the
one at the Soo, where all the laundry-
ing for the company's fleet is done.
The storehouse and cold storage com-
bined in one building of the same
dimensions as the former will also em-
ploy several men, and the extension of
the present dock and warehouse will
likely mean that the working force of
freight handlers will be increased.

Those people who all require homes,
and the increase to the population will
mean a good deal to Point Edward.
Will Build Dwellings.
It is understood that the Mueller
Brass Company will erect a number
of houses in the south end of the town
next spring for their employees. The
dwellings will likely cost about \$2,000
each, and it is thought that the con-
tract for their construction will go to
some local contractor.

There has been some talk of install-
ing a system of calling patrolmen back

their respective beats. Under present
conditions, calls often come to head-
quarters for a policeman, and there is
no established method by which any
of the officers on duty can be notified
that they are wanted at the office.
Chief Forbes is in favor of a system
similar to that used in Stratford, which

**OTTAWA'S RESIGNATION
ACCEPTED BY UNION**
Varsity, McGill and Queen's Will Fight
It Out for Intercollegiate
Championship.

Toronto, Oct. 17.—The resignation
of Ottawa College from the Intercol-
legiate Union was accepted at a meet-
ing of the executive at the King Ed-
ward Hotel last night. Father Stan-
ton's team dropped out as the result
of the finding of the committee on the
investigation of the Queen's-Ottawa
College fiasco in Ottawa. The col-
legians asked that the decision awarding
the game to Queen's be reversed. This
the committee declined to do, so the
resignation was accepted.
Ottawa College has had the benefit

of two home gates, one with Queen's
and one with University of Toronto.
The return engagements will not be
filled. Exhibition games may be played
with outside colleges. It is not
improbable that Cornell will be
brought here Nov. 2 to meet the Old-
Boys' team at Varsity. The blue and
white regulars will not play owing to
the chances of injuries. No new sched-
ule will be drafted.
