

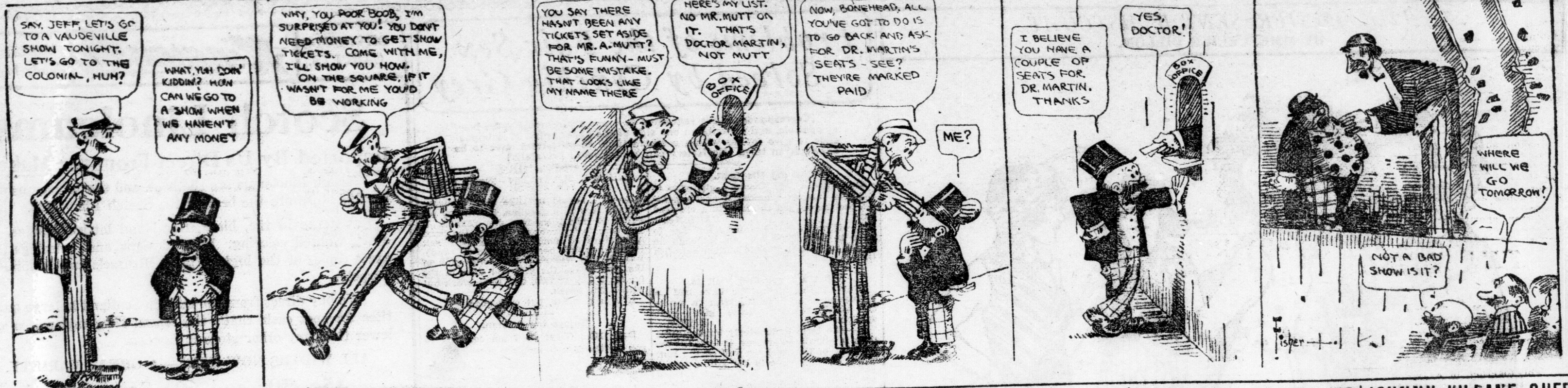

Only Changes Probable Are Those Which Will Place the Guelph and Berlin Franchises in Erie and Niagara Falls—Wild Rumors of Entering Youngstown and Other Cities Are Ridiculous.

[BY JINX.] Some interesting things are at present developing in connection with the Canadian League, and until the annual meeting of this organization is held in December, it is altogether probable that some wild rumors and stories will receive publication as to just what cities will be in this league when the season of 1914 rolls around. There will be some changes in the Canadian League as far as its geographical position is concerned. There is little doubt of that. Both Guelph and Berlin will be out of it next year beyond a doubt. But the recent stories that Youngstown, Ohio, and several other American cities will have Canadian League franchises appear on the surface to be mere wild rumors without any apparent foundation or credence. A Ridiculous Story. Probably one of the wildest stories that has developed is that one from Brantford, which states that the Canadian League will put teams in Buffalo, Rochester, Baltimore and a couple more American cities in order to fight the Federal League. This is the very worst kind of rot. The idea of Canadian League franchises being placed in these cities, where already International and Federal League franchises are, is so ridiculous that it is hardly worth mentioning. Supposing they were, how could London, Hamilton and Ottawa hope to compete with teams such cities would demand? To say that the Canadian League intended securing franchises in New York, Chicago and San Francisco would be just as reasonable. Brantford Franchise Will Not Be Transferred. OUTSIDE MEN IN FACTORY LEAGUE

Some New Rulings Made by Manufacturers' League Last Evening. Will Also Allow O. H. A. Players to Play on Teams Provided They Work With Firm. This Is the Limit: Canadian League To Oppose Federal

A Ridiculous Story From Brantford to the Effect That Canadian League Franchises Will Be Placed in Buffalo and Rochester.

Brantford, Nov. 7.—A radical change in the make-up of the Canadian League is foreshadowed, it would seem, by the offer made to President T. J. Nelson, of the Brantford club, of \$2,500 for the local franchise, the intention being to move it away from this city. Jimmy Murphy, the Toronto lacrosse manager, is behind the deal, but appears would indicate that there is an organization behind Murphy's move. President Nelson is in Toronto today discussing the proposition. There is nothing definitely settled, and the franchise may remain here, but wide changes are forecasted. GUELPH WELCOMES A SMALLER LEAGUE

Prefers Playing in a Purely Canadian Organization, It Is Said. NO STOCK COMPANY. Committee Appointed To Form One in Royal City Has Decided Not to Act Just Yet. Guelph, Nov. 7.—The baseball situation regarding the Canadian League is evidently undergoing some material changes, for close upon the heels of the dispatch from Brantford in this morning's papers comes the rumor of a new league, consisting of Ottawa, Hamilton and London, on the one side of the line, and Niagara Falls, N. Y., Erie, Pa., and Youngstown, O., on the other side. It has been figured out that with the dropping of Berlin, Guelph, Brantford and St. Thomas they would then have a class B league. This would leave it up to the four Canadian cities left, with the addition of possibly Galt and St. Catharines, to form a class C Canadian League, as with the addition of three American cities the other league would have to change its name. It is understood that the local committee appointed some weeks ago have decided not to make any move towards securing funds for a joint stock company to buy the Guelph franchise until something more definite has been announced. The idea of a purely Canadian League, such as the one suggested above, with possibly Woodstock and Stratford added to make it an eight-club circuit, is meeting with hearty approval in Guelph, and will be backed liberally.

RITCHIE UNCOVERS ANOTHER KETCHELL

Champion Lightweight Discovers a Promising Boxer in Sparring Partner. HE HAS A FIGHTING NAME. Is Known as "Knockout" Sweeney, and He is Only Nineteen-Year-Old Boy. New York, N. Y., Nov. 8.—Besides convincing a host of New York fight fans that he is a real champion, even in advance of his second hearing next Monday night with Leach Cross, Willie Ritchie is today credited with having uncovered a phenomenon who will fill the shoes of Stanley Ketchell. Up at Dal' Hawkins' roadhouse, when Nov. 24 is training, he has as a sparring partner a 19-year-old boy, known as "Knockout" Sweeney, who is declared to be "the goods." Ritchie, Harry Foley, his manager, and the whole camp are strong for Sweeney. In a year or so, they say, he will be a middleweight, and Foley, who was a middleweight himself, declares the boy the most promising prospect he ever saw. Ritchie and Cross today were both beginning to taper off the hard grind, and both claimed to be in fine shape. There is little betting on the mill so far, but it is expected that on this showing in training the champion will be a long favorite at the ringside.

WOLGAST WON'T BE READY UNTIL ABOUT DEC. 15

Cadillac, Mich., Nov. 7.—Dec. 15 is the date set by Ad Wolgast as the time he will enter the ring again. Ad. has been laid up at his home here for several weeks with a pair of cracked ribs, but is now practically well. However, the former champion wants two more weeks of rest and then about three weeks to get into shape for his next battle. "All this newspaper dope about me fighting Charley White in Milwaukee on Nov. 24 or 28, or Ritchie in New York late this month, is bunk," said Ad. today. "The middle of December will be early enough for me to try my luck again. Wolgast has been offered the chance to meet the winner of the Cross-Ritchie match by clubs in San Francisco, New York, and in Milwaukee. "If either of those men will wait for me until Dec. 15 I'll surely take him on," said Ad. "In fact a match with the winner of the Cross-Ritchie scrap is just what I'm looking for." Wolgast is taking life easy here and is living the simple life in its simplest form. "This is a great country for me," said Ad. "I feel fine up here, and I'm going to stick right here until I go to battle for the championship."
