PLAN REORGANIZATION OF PERE MARQUETTE

Ninety-Nine Million Dollars of New Securities To Be Issued.

LANSING, Mich., Nov. 27.—The plan to reorganize the Pere Marquette Railroad, which has been bankrupt for several years, and operated by a receiver, was today submitted to the state railroad commission for final action. It was announced that the plan has been approved by a majority of the creditors. The plan, as submitted to the railroad commission, provides for the issuance of new securities amounting to more than \$99,000,000. These assets, with securities which the railroad is said to own, would make the capitalization of the new company \$165,000,000.

It is claimed that the road will have a cash balance of \$16,000,000 after the indebtedness, most of which has long been outstanding, has been paid off.

WHOLE OF INDIA IS ENTHUSIASTIC OVER BRITAIN'S POSITION

Regards Victory as Certain. Viceroy Finds.

GENEROSITY CONTINUES

\$3,300,000 Latest Subscription to India Relief Funds.

LONDON, Nov. 27.—(Through Reuters' Ottawa Agency)—A special dispatch from Delhi says: "The viceroy, Lord Chelmsford, who has been making a tour of India lasting nearly three months, is finding everywhere a keen enthusiasm among all classes to win the war. The whole of India now regards victory as certain, and, somewhat naturally, some sections of the educated classes are already speculating on post-war changes, and urging domestic political reforms more keenly and openly perhaps than they did when the issue seemed less certain."

Native officers of the Indian army who have returned from France are extremely optimistic, and speak of the marked superiority of the Allies' military qualities and resources over those of the enemy.

Throughout India generous war gifts continue to be received from ruling princes of all classes. The latest official statement shows that 102 lakhs of rupees (\$3,300,000) have been subscribed to the Central India imperial relief fund since its inception, of which sum 29 lakhs (\$875,000) have been expended among the families of men at the front, disabled soldiers and heirs of deceased soldiers all over the country. The Calcutta and Bengal Chambers of Commerce are providing a motor machine battery for the front, in addition to the motor ambulance unit already provided. The manufacture of munitions, transport wagons, etc., continues steadily throughout the country.

Tranquil on Frontier.

The condition on the northwest frontier is completely tranquil. When the nomads recently gave some trouble there, a blockade was instituted, which had the most salutary effect, and the hostile gatherings were easily dispersed by a small body of troops with what aeroplanes successfully co-operated.

The crop prospects generally are exceptionally favorable, wheat promising well. Cotton has been damaged somewhat by late rains, but is booming, especially the jute, cotton and tea industries, although high freights are somewhat affecting exports.

STEAMSHIP LANE FREE FROM ENTENTE SHIPPING

BOSTON, Nov. 27.—The transatlantic steamship lane running south of Nantucket Shoals lightship in the vicinity of which five ships were sunk by the German submarine U-33 on October 2, was recently cleared of foreign traffic today, according to reports received here. This apparent abandonment of the regular route of shipping was believed to be a victory for the British cruiser-destroyer force, which was reported to have been engaged in the vicinity.

Incoming ships reported a rough sea, which would ordinarily interfere with extensive submarine operations.

BLOCKADE PINCHING GERMANS' PET CORNS

BERLIN, via London, Nov. 27.—A general curtailment of railroad traffic due to the requirements of the army in the matter of rolling stock for the transportation of troops, and a decided revision of the railway schedule for December 1, train schedules are now being revised to eliminate all trains that can be readily dispensed with. The same desire to save fuel will, it is reported, find expression in the closing of the railway at midnight being fixed instead of 1 o'clock in the morning, as at present.

PREMATURE STORY SPOILED PURCHASE

Prevented French From Securing Much Needed Tonnage.

PARIS, Nov. 27.—The negotiations between Great Britain and France for the turning over to France of a hundred vessels representing 600,000 tons, which was reported to have been concluded because a Paris newspaper published the news pending the arrangement of details, according to statements made in the chamber of deputies today, during a continuation of the debate on the French merchant marine. Louis Nails, under-secretary of state for marine, said the signing of the agreement was that remained to be done when the British admiralty announced that it was impossible to consent to the transfer of the vessels. The hope was expressed by one speaker that Great Britain would, nevertheless, allow France to have a number of vessels now building.

Deputy Guernier said boats were being sold daily and that they could not be lost.

DUKE AND DUCHESS ARRIVE AT TORONTO

New Governor-General Will Spend Week at Ontario Capital.

TORONTO, Nov. 27.—Their excellencies the Duke and Duchess of Devonshire, accompanied by their daughter and staff, arrived in Toronto this evening for a week's visit. About a hundred guests, including the lieutenant-governor, several members of the cabinet and Mayor Church, met them at the union station and an informal reception was held. Their excellencies were then driven to Governor's residence, where they spent the evening quietly. Tomorrow the formal presentation of address will take place in the legislative chamber.

STEAMERS IN DISTRESS.

HALIFAX, Nov. 28.—According to a wireless dispatch from the coast guard station at St. John's, Newfoundland, a number of messages have been picked up by the wireless operators on duty at the island. Nothing can be ascertained as to the reason for the calls.

HALIFAX, Nov. 28.—The steamer Pro Patria (French) is ashore at Point, near Cranberry Head, C. E. The steamer has some passengers aboard. Tugs are being sent to her assistance.

Ontario's War Hospital To Be About Doubled

Orpington Will Have Capacity of 2,014 Beds, if Plans Go Through.

TORONTO, Nov. 27.—Instructions have been sent to England by the Provincial Government for the immediate preparation of plans and estimates for the enlargement of the Ontario military hospital at Orpington, England, which would give capacity for 2,014 beds. As the cost of all sorts of material has risen considerably since the hospital was erected, a proportionately larger expenditure than required for the original hospital will be entailed, but an important part of the necessary material has already been secured and no time will be lost in carrying out the plans to successful completion.

The premier stated today that for some time past the hospital has been taxed to its fullest capacity. A request has now come from the Ontario Government, made at the suggestion of Sir George Perley, that the hospital be enlarged to meet the growing demands upon it; in fact that its capacity be about doubled. In making this request, Sir Robert Borden pointed out that the extension cannot be accomplished without materially increasing the staff or kitchen accommodation of the hospital. He added: "I would be grateful if your Government would consider the question of enlarging the Ontario hospital at Orpington by one thousand beds, and in doing so, I am confident you will be rendering a real service to the Dominion and the Empire at this juncture."

On receipt of this request the Government of Ontario promptly agreed to undertake the work, provided difficult and unsurmountable nature do not intervene.

PICKED GERMANS UNABLE TO STOP FRENCH ZOUAVES

Chasseurs of the Guard Driven From Strategic Post.

ASSAULT CARRIED HILL

Serbs and Allies Storm Hill 1050 and Hold It Against Attack.

SALONKI, Nov. 27.—The official communication from Serbian headquarters, issued today, reads: "Yesterday the brave French zouaves co-operating with our troops undertook a series of attacks on Hill 1050, which is of great strategic importance. The attacks were crowned with success, and we carried the hill by assault. It was defended by picked German troops. Chasseurs of the Guard, who had orders to hold the hill at all costs. Several enemy counter-attacks, with the object of retaking the lost positions, without consideration for the losses involved, were repulsed. The hill remained definitely in our hands. On the rest of our front, the weather hampered the operations. The Serbian statement issued by Paris said that Bulgarian forces on the Macedonian front had launched a counter-attack on Serbia in the Cerova River region the previous night. The Bulgarians were repulsed with heavy losses.

The Italians continue to make progress in the region of the Mauthausen. The text of the communication follows: "On the Cerna front a Bulgarian counter-attack upon Serbian positions last night was repulsed with sanguinary losses. The north of Monastir the artillery fighting, in which both sides are taking part, is being continued with vigor. On our left wing Italian troops are continuing to advance in the direction of the region of Dibo, four miles northwest of Monastir."

LADY RUN DOWN BY TRAIN AT INGERSOLL

Chances Are Slim For Recovery of Mrs. John Station.

[Special to The Advertiser.] INGERSOLL, Nov. 27.—Mrs. John Station is in the Alexandra Hospital as the result of being struck by the incoming C. P. R. train from Port Huron, which was crossing the bridge over the railway at the King street crossing, not far from her residence.

There is a sharp curve in the track at the point where the accident occurred, and it is probable she could not see the train. The engineer sounded the whistle, and when it was unheeded, the brakes were applied, but the distance was so short it was impossible to avert the accident.

Two physicians were called, and the injured woman was taken to the hospital in the ambulance. Her right arm was crushed, and she also sustained injuries about the head. It is also feared she may be internally hurt.

Wife Drops Dead on News of Her Husband's Death

Accidental Self-Destruction of Comedian Causes Second Tragedy.

NEW YORK, Nov. 27.—Charlie Case, a blackface comedian, widely known throughout the United States and Canada, accidentally shot and instantly killed himself at a local hotel today, while waiting for a telephone call. A dispatch from Buffalo to the Associated Press tonight, says Mrs. Charlotte Case, wife of the comedian, dropped dead in a room at the hotel just after being apprised of her husband's death.

NOT SO SERIOUS.

SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 27.—A radio message received here tonight from Captain Dietrichson, of the Norwegian freight steamer Niel Nielsen, which early today reported herself disabled 250 miles off the Washington coast, said that his vessel was not in a dangerous position and that the United States coast guard cutter Snohomish was proceeding to his aid. The Nielsen was making her maiden voyage from Seattle to Vladivostok with a general cargo.

BRITISH REFUSE ENEMY ENVOY TO U. S. A. ANY PASS

No Safe Conduct to Austrian Ambassador.

SURPRISES WASHINGTON

Action Unexpected, and May Precipitate Another Controversy.

LONDON, Nov. 27.—The foreign office has sent Ambassador Page a note definitely refusing to grant a safe conduct to Count Adam Tarnowski von Tarnow, the new Austro-Hungarian ambassador to the United States. The reason for the refusal may be paraphrased as follows: "Even if international law forbade the refusal of such a safe conduct, the action of Austria and German embassies and consulates abroad has been so far from meeting the growing demands upon it; in fact that its capacity be about doubled. In making this request, Sir Robert Borden pointed out that the extension cannot be accomplished without materially increasing the staff or kitchen accommodation of the hospital. He added: 'I would be grateful if your Government would consider the question of enlarging the Ontario hospital at Orpington by one thousand beds, and in doing so, I am confident you will be rendering a real service to the Dominion and the Empire at this juncture.'"

MAY RESULT IN NEW CONTROVERSY.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 27.—Another controversy between the American Government and the Entente Allies is in prospect, as a result of the refusal of the British Government to grant safe conduct to Count Tarnowski, the newly-appointed Austro-Hungarian ambassador to the United States.

In the absence of official advice on the subject, officials of the state department were not in a position today to discuss it formally, or to forecast the course the Government is likely to pursue. It was made evident, however, that the unfavorable action of the British foreign office on the notice of the intention of the new ambassador to cross the Atlantic to his post came as an unpleasant surprise. It had not been doubted here that Great Britain would be the last power to deny the privileged character of a diplomatic officer on such a voyage.

Use Civil War Incident.

The fact is recognized that in protesting against the removal of the confederate commissions from the British ship Trent, in the famous Mason and Slidell case, the United States had been mainly concerned with the protection afforded by the British flag, under which the Trent sailed, and it is said that it was on that account that the United States had not taken the action of its naval commander. But it is held here that though secondary, the protest also was based on the right of diplomatic officers to make their way to their posts in neutral countries without molestation. It probably will be on that basis that the matter of Count Tarnowski's interrupted journey will be taken up with the Allies, for it is well understood that the London foreign office is supported by France, Italy and Russia in its action.

No Formal Request.

It was learned today that the state department so far has not made a formal request for a safe conduct for the Austrian ambassador, but has confined itself to a transmission of the request of the Austrian Government for such a courtesy. Therefore it is probable that if the issue is to be made up it will be necessary for the United States now to make such request on its own account. There is an absence of any precedent exactly fitting this case, which requires the department to be very careful in assuming ground and the text of the note handed to Ambassador Page will be awaited before a decision as to the course to be followed is reached.

ENEMY NATIONS IN SORE STRAITS TO SECURE ANY FOOD

Appeals of Americans for Supplies Indicates This.

EXPLAINS PEACE MOVES

Daily Mail Sees Reasons for Present Intrigues in the Shortage of Supplies.

LONDON, Nov. 28.—The Daily Mail today makes a feature story of what it describes as highly authentic information that the food situation in both Germany and Austria-Hungary is more desperate than has hitherto been generally believed. This information is based on what is claimed to be the necessity of the American officials in both countries to send urgent demands home for supplies of food. The food supplies, it is said, are now arriving and are being placed in depots under the vigilant supervision of American officials.

The newspaper says its informant declares the Americans in the last few weeks have reported to Washington that their ration tickets are useless as there is little or no food to ration the nation, and that the action of the American Government in hastening supplies of food to them is only interpreted in the light of showing that the American embassies and consulates now regard the food situation in Austria and Germany with the greatest possible anxiety.

In an editorial dealing with this story the Daily Mail says it explains the "peace intrigues which the Germans are fomenting in the United States and elsewhere," and urges the members of the Senate to resist every possible pressure, especially the tightening of the blockade, to prevent Germany from taking advantage of the seizure of the corn lands of Rumania.
