AGENDA FOR CONFERENCE OF PREMIERS IN BRITAIN

Premier Meighen Tells House
Only Four Points Are
Important.

FOREIGN RELATIONS

Will Figure Largely in Discussion With Premiers of Dominions.

OTTAWA, April 25.—Lord Shaughnessy's memorandum on the railway question, which he submitted to the Government, was the subject of questions on the orders of the day at the opening of the House of Commons this afternoon. Hon. F. B. Colborne, minister of the interior, has been asked to make public with the consent and approval of the Government.

The premier replied that Lord Shaughnessy had asked him whether he saw any objection to the document being made public, and he stated that he could see no objection.

Frank Cahill (Pontiac) asked whether there had been any arrangement whereby the publication of the memorandum was withheld until after the second reading of the Grand Trunk bill.

"None whatever," replied the premier.

Prime Ministers' Conference.

On the orders of the day Hon. Arthur Meighen made a statement with regard to the prime ministers' conference to take place in London next June. He stated that last October he had conferred in a proposal by the prime minister of the United Kingdom that the conference should be held not later than June of this year. Since the conference there has been an opportunity for personal and direct consultation between the prime ministers on the broad issues of policy.

Views were exchanged more than a year ago concerning the holding of a conference during 1920, said Mr. Meighen, but it was concluded that this would be impracticable. The proposal was made and accepted last October on the basis that the June meeting would be of a special and preliminary character, having in view the necessity of discussing:

1. Preparation for the special constitutional conference contemplated in resolution 9, of the imperial war conference of 1917 to be held at a later date, this preliminary discussion to include such questions as the meeting place, date, composition and agenda.

At the same time it was considered that the June meeting would afford an opportunity for discussing certain other matters of common concern, which are of an urgent or important nature, such as:

2. A general review of the main features of foreign relations, particularly as they affect the dominions.

3. The question of the renewal of the Anglo-Japanese alliance, which is indeed only a part of the general part of the subject of foreign relations, but which is especially urgent, since under the terms of the alliance a decision should be reached this year.

4. Preliminary consideration, preparatory for the constitutional conference, of some working method for arriving at a common understanding as to policy in such external affairs as concern all parts of the empire.

Of Minor Importance.

The prime minister went on to say that subjects of minor importance suggested for inclusion in the agenda of the June meeting. These subjects, in view of their technical character, and of the fact that they were not of the same urgency or importance, would seem to belong to the agenda of the conference.

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Imperial conference proper whenever its next regular session was held. It was desirable that the meeting of the prime ministers in June should not be of a prolonged character, so as to enable them to give their full attention to the subjects of the conference. The Canadian Government had already expressed a doubt as to the inclusion of some of these questions. These additional questions, the first two of which were proposed by the Governments of Australia and India respectively, and the remainder by the British Government, were as follows:

1. Inter-imperial communications by land, sea and air.
2. The position of British Indians in other parts of the empire.
3. Naval, military and air defence.
4. The recommendations of the overseas settlement conference already held in London.
5. The development of civil aviation.
6. The reports of the imperial shipping committee appointed as a result of resolutions 11 and 24 of the imperial war conference of 1918.
7. The findings of the technical commission appointed to discuss the question of imperial wireless communications.
8. The question of German reparations, including the division as between the various parties of the British Empire of any amounts received.
9. Imperial statistical bureau.
10. Imperial patents.

Not Hard and Fast Agenda.

Mr. Meighen said that the proposed agenda could not be regarded as a hard and fast arrangement. In the view of the Canadian Government not more than the first four would be closely discussed. He proposed that the House should devote Wednesday to discussion of the course that Canada's representatives should pursue.

In answer to Mr. Lapointe, the prime minister stated that he had no information in regard to the discussion on imperial defence which would take place at the conference.

Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux (Maisonneuve and Gaspé) moved that in view of unlimited natural resources requiring development in the Gaspé peninsula that better transportation facilities should be established at the earliest possible moment.

The premier, in the absence of the minister of railways, assured Mr. Lemieux that the importance of the Gaspé Bay district was appreciated. He gave assurance that it would be sufficient to pay the fixed charges on 400 miles of line. Settlement was being retarded in this section, and some of the settlers would probably have to leave the country if the train service was not improved.

S. W. Jacobs (George Etienne Cartier) thought that this was a matter to be brought to the attention of the high-salaried management of the Canadian National Railways. He referred to the duplication of the Ottawa-Montreal service, saying that a few of the number of trains run on this section might be diverted to the section referred to by Mr. Cahill.

Commission Alone Responsible.

Premier Meighen said that if the resolution carried it meant going back to the position of 1903, and impairing the efficiency of the railway commission. If Parliament was going to do that, a clause should be inserted in the railway act providing for discriminatory rates.

There had been a feeling throughout the Dominion for some time that the railway commission existed to do the will of the Government. The continued growth of this sentiment would not only harm the railway commission, but the Dominion as well. The railway commission was not an instrument of the Government, but was a judicial tribunal. Parliament would be wise to leave the railway commission alone while holding it responsible for the discharge of its duties.

The sooner Canada could reach the position where a general reduction in freight rates could be put into effect, the better. The present rates were high, and were such as to constitute a serious detriment to the Dominion. The causes must be removed before there could be any general reduction, and the sooner they were reviewed, the better.

"Went at it Blind."

Col. J. A. Currie (North Simcoe) said that while the railway commission undertook to increase the freight rates, they went at it "blind." The result was that business was at a standstill in Canada. It did not pay anyone to ship over the railways any more. The Canadian freight rates to foreign countries were higher than those of the United States. "I can't understand," said Col. Currie, "why this country cannot get the rates lowered by the railway commission in the last six months to such an extent that the boat tariff up to June 15, and subsequent to September 15, will be the same as the rail fare, but from June 15 to September 15, it will be \$10 more than the all-rail fare to cover the additional service features, such as dances and concerts on board the boat, and picnic ashore, which are provided by the company."

DIED FROM BURNS.

UNEMPLOYED CLASH WITH THE POLICE; SEVERAL ARE HURT

Three Thousand Gather in
Front of Toronto City Hall.

SIX ARE ARRESTED

TORONTO, April 25.—Defiance on the part of a number of unemployed men in a gathering of about 3,000 in front of the city hall this afternoon resulted in a clash with the police, in which the latter were wholly victorious. Some of the policemen, however, received slight injuries, and more than one fell, or was knocked down. There were numerous sore heads among the crowd, as the police used their fists and batons to considerable effect. One "demonstrator," Fred Terry, was removed to St. Michael's Hospital. He had been kicked in the abdomen by one of the horses used by a squad of mounted police in the fray.

Six arrests were made. In each case the charge was disorderly conduct.

The demonstration in front of the city hall followed a parade of several hundred unemployed men to the Parliament Buildings a few hours earlier, where, through a deputation, they laid their case before the attorney-general, Hon. W. R. Ridd, minister of labor; Hon. Manning Doherty, minister of agriculture, and Hon. Beniah Bowman, minister of lands and forests. Premier Drury had not returned from his week-end visit to his home near Barrie. The ministers, while not holding out any hope of assistance, promised to consider the unemployment question in cabinet session with the premier.

Fiery Speeches.

The trouble at the city hall had been brewing for some time. Half a dozen orators declaimed against conditions in fiery speeches, despite the fact that a cordon of police was lined up in front of the civic pile ready for business, and at last detectives were detailed to arrest four speakers whom Deputy Chief Geddes had been observing. This precipitated the clash. The detectives were recognized. "Down them," "Kick them out," shouted the crowd, which then started a chorus of "boos" that kept up until at last the police rushed the crowd.

The police had borne a good deal of chaffing up to this time, and when they entered into action it was upon a signal from the deputy chief. The latter tried to tell the crowd what was coming, but his voice was drowned in the noise.

With Right Good Will.

Thereupon he signalled to his men to charge. They did charge, apparently with a right good will. In a minute the crowd was scattering, paying little attention to the direction, but making a speedy getaway. The police on foot used fists and clubs with equal freedom, and were backed up by mounted policemen in the dispersal of the crowd.

The chief phase of the police charge was over in about five minutes, but the officers followed up their advantage for a considerable distance on the nearby streets until there was no semblance of a crowd left in sight. Trophies of the "battle" were carried into the city hall by the officers in the form of mottos which had been used in the parade.

TORONTO, April 25.—The police came in direct contact with the unemployed paraders this afternoon, when, on orders of Deputy Chief Geddes, police resorted to the mounted squad swept the city hall drive and lawn clear of the huge throng which had gathered.

Deputy Chief Geddes made an effort to tell the throng that the meeting was over and the place was to be cleared, but his words were drowned in a roar of jeers and hisses.

Then the police, augmented by reinforcements, charged.

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serves from every division in the city, went into action and cleared the crowd away in five minutes.

The move of the police seemed to catch every one unawares. The scene was one of fleeing hundreds.

An angry crowd tried to pull a mounted policeman from his horse. The constable used his rawhide whip freely. Three men attacked one constable and started to tear his uniform. He used his baton freely and drove off his attackers. Four arrests were made.
