**TAKE STEPS TOWARDS
PUBLICLY-OWNED LINE**

TORONTO, Oct. 11.—A step for-
ward for Toronto a publicly owned
suburban service is to be taken with-
in a few days. This first service,
while itself not a suburban one, marks
the beginning of a new practice in
railway operation in Toronto, from
which it is the intention that a sub-
urban service should gradually be
developed.

Commencing, perhaps this week,
and certainly this month, the National
Railways will operate a storage bat-
tery passenger and freight car be-
tween Toronto and Washago on the
old Canadian Northern line. It is
understood to be the intention to in-
troduce cars of this type, and also
gasoline driven cars.

**SEE ELECTION
IN BRITAIN IN
EARLY WINTER**

**Political Writers Predict Con-
test Will Be Staged in
December.**

AWAIT PREMIER'S SPEECH

**Lloyd George To Defend
Policy in Manchester
Address.**

LONDON, Oct. 11.—(Can-
adian Press Cable).—Political
writers of all shades in tonight's
London papers declare that a
general election in December is
almost certain.

Gossip today has been largely
concerned with the premier's
possible course in his speech at
Manchester on Saturday, when,
it is understood, his main pur-
pose will be to defend the govern-
ment's Near Eastern policy.

It is generally recognized that
Lloyd George will be more than
ready to meet his critics with all
his old force; but there is a good
deal of doubt whether, in his
Saturday speech he will pay any
special attention to the rebellion
in the coalition. The premier is
more likely to give the country
his opinion of the alleged mis-
chief-making in regard to the
Near Eastern situation. He left
London tonight for the country,
and may possibly go to North
Hampshire direct from his home.

The London Evening Standard to-
night, alluding to the statement to-
day that none of the premier's Con-
servative colleagues has any idea of
leaving the ministry at this juncture,
says that if the choice came between
loyalty to the coalition and loyalty
to the Conservative party, they
would decide that disruption of
conservatism would be a greater
calamity than disruption of the coali-
tion. The Standard, incidentally,
is a journal that has wobbled greatly
in its former support of the coalition.

**Armistice Pact Contains
Exact Terms As Laid
Down by Allies.**

MUDANIA, Oct. 11.—The
armistice convention
signed by the representatives
of the Turkish Nationalists
and the allied powers here to-
day last night contains the exact
terms as submitted by Lieut-
General Harrington, the British
leader, and the specifications of
which were made public yes-
terday.

Imet Pasha, the Turkish
representative, held out for a
larger number of gendarmes in
Eastern Thrace, and argued
lengthily on several other
points, but eventually gave
way on every point of the allied
demands.

General Harrington and Gen-
eral Charpy, the latter the
French delegate, left for Con-
stantinople this morning, after
a few hours' sleep aboard their
warships.

before the election remains an open

If he should resign it is believed that
Mr. Austen Chamberlain would be
asked to form a cabinet, and, ac-
cording to those close to Mr. Cham-
berlain, he has made it known that
in such an event he would immedi-

general elections.

Mr. Chamberlain apparently re-
mains a firm supporter of his chief.
The present Parliament still has
a year to run, but the insistent
demands from many quarters for
elections make it virtually impos-
sible for the government to ignore
the polls much longer. The Labor
party is particularly anxious to try
its fortunes again, and for months
has been preparing to enter the list
with some 400 candidates.

**FIND 3 MISSING
FIRE SUFFERERS**

**List of Casualties of Northern
Disaster Now Totals
Forty-Three.**

**Relief Committee Denies
Charges Against Provincial
Police Officers.**

COBALT, Oct. 11.—Three names
were struck off the list of dead and
missing in the Teniskaming fire dis-
aster this afternoon. Clairve Dunn
of Halesbury, for six days reported
one of the victims there, is alive and
well, and it is said here tonight that
Archie and Earl McGuigan of Dack
Township, near Charlton, are safe.

The casualty list tonight stands at
43, the identity of all of whom are
known, with the exception of the re-
mains of a girl of about 17, lying in
the morgue at New Lisford. This
body was found near the brickyards
at Halesbury.

A man giving the name of J. Mc-
Laughlin, Toronto, created some ex-
citement here by representing him-
self to be connected with the fed-
eral department of public works. In
his alleged capacity he is said to
have "ordered" several hundred
thousand feet of lumber and a large
quantity of roofing, declaring that
work was to be commenced on the
destroyed government buildings at
once. He gave as reference the
Canadian Bank of Commerce at Co-
balt, but Inspector Moore made some
inquiries, and found the man to be
a fraud, but harmless.

Allegations of abuses by provincial
officers of relief supplies, the
refugees suffering thereby, were
vigorously denied tonight by the
Northern Ontario fire relief com-
mittee. On behalf of the members of
that body, Mayor Ferguson of North
Bay wired Gen. Williams, commend-
ing the work of the officers and of
Hon. Benoit Bowman, since coming
north, and stating that all had work-
ed eighteen hours a day while here.

EXCITES INTEREST**

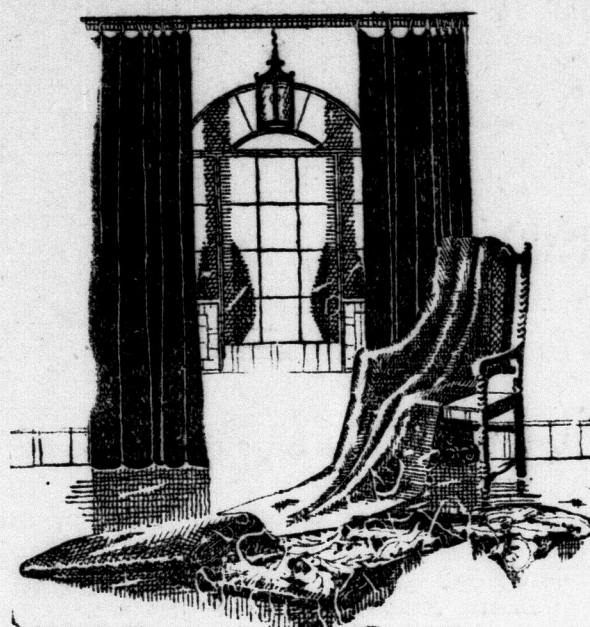
**Supreme Court Dismisses Ap-
peal of W. R. Jackson
Against Crown Attorney
McCrimmon.**

ST. THOMAS, Oct. 11.—The cul-
mination of a lawsuit which has cre-
ated a great deal of interest locally
was reached Tuesday, when the ap-
pellate division of the supreme court
dismissed the appeal in the case of
W. R. Jackson, jeweler of this city,
against Crown Attorney McCrimmon.

The appeal was from the decision
of Mr. Justice Latchford given last
spring, and concerned the purchase
and mortgaging of a farm which the
plaintiff sold to Mr. Schario of Port
Stanley several years ago.

Some time after purchasing the
farm Mr. Schario had dealings with
the legal firm of McCrimmon & Mc-
Crimmon, and gave to the defendant,
mortgages on the land without the
knowledge or consent of the plaintiff,
according to the plaintiff's disposi-
tions. On learning about the mort-
gage given to Mr. McCrimmon, Mr.
Jackson caused notice to be given to
Mr. Schario and Crown Attorney Mc-
Crimmon that he was prepared to
take action to clear his title. Mr.
Schario soon afterwards surrendered
to Mr. Jackson all claims to the
property, but Mr. McCrimmon de-
manded payment of moneys which he
claimed to have advanced Mr.
Schario. Mr. Jackson offered to ac-
cept the money which was owing to
him by Mr. Schario, and to convey
the lands either to Mr. Schario or
Mr. McCrimmon, but the proposed

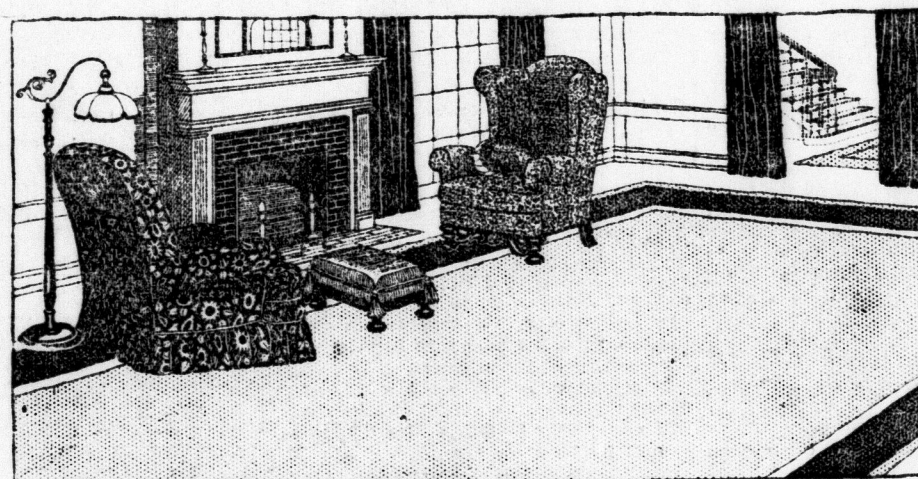

**SAYS RUSSIA MUST
BE RECKONED WITH**

**Foreign Minister Urges Great-
er Consideration of Soviet
Government.**

MOSCOW, Oct. 11.—Russia as a world power must be reckoned with in the consideration of all matters bearing upon her interests, such as the freedom of commercial navigation through the Dardanelles, and therefore any proposition to leave the Soviets without representation in the first conference proposed by the allies for settlement of the Near

Eastern question is altogether unsatisfactory to the Moscow government.

In expressing this view M. Tchitcherine, Soviet foreign minister, said: "We are not making threats and are not rattling the sword, but we do insist upon proper consideration in all questions relating to the Near East, particularly the commercial freedom of the Straits."

"Questions in which we have tremendous interests will naturally be discussed at the first conference, and the Russian government feels it should be invited to that as well as to the one to be held later."

Genoa and Hague conferences to help us, is very unjust, and we will act accordingly."
