

TOTAL ECLIPSE
OF SUN COMING

Unusual Event Will Be Witnessed Here on Jan. 24
at 9:04 a.m.

NEXT ONE IN 2144

If you wish to see a total eclipse of the sun without leaving London, your last chance will be on the morning of Jan. 24 at 9:04; you mustn't be a minute late or you'll miss it. The next time such an eclipse will be visible here will be in the year 2144.

Explaining the wonders of the present eclipse and the pleasure of observing the movements of heavenly bodies Dr. H. R. Kingston gave the above statement today, adding that study of the heavenly bodies is not confined to a group of professors, profoundly learned in the mathematical side of astronomical science. "Some people have an interest in order to understand or appreciate anything astronomical one must have deep knowledge of mathematics. This is far from true. One may have only a sort of geometrical sense of position.

In order to enjoy the wonders of radio it is not necessary to be able to make the calculations essential to the construction of a radio set. Dr. Kingston pointed out. There are many observers who do splendid work and get the greatest pleasure out of it in making observations of appearances, distances, etc. who could never master the intricate mathematical calculations necessary to the work of the physicist in astronomy.

2,000 Miles Across.

"If one had the power to go far out into space, let's say a billion miles or so, he would see far above him, in the distance, the sun and nearly the earth and moon—the latter a comparatively small body only 2,000 miles across. The shadow of the moon extends like a slender pencil not long enough to reach. When it does reach the earth because of the nearness of the two bodies the shadow of the shadow is more than 167 miles across. Also remember that the moon must be directly between the sun and the earth, that is at the time of new moon. But we have a new moon once a month, but we do not have an eclipse, since the shadow usually passes to one side or the other of the earth.

"The total eclipse is seen only in the direct path of the shadow of the moon, but partial eclipse may be seen for 2,000 miles each side of the true shadow."

Shadow Described.

"In the eclipse of Jan. 24, the shadow of the moon will touch the earth first in Minnesota, near the Lake of the Woods. It will pass through Ontario, covering a large part of the most populous district. The center of the shadow will enter Ontario near Godfrey and pass through Kitchener and several smaller places on to Buffalo and thence across New York state part of Connecticut and across the Atlantic ocean—this at sunset at a point between the Shetland and Orkney Islands. The northern edge of the shadow will pass, I believe, through Lancaster, York, and then over across Lake Ontario at Port Huron.

It is particularly interesting for us to have renewed interest in the shadow along the edge of the shadow.

Toronto Jan. 5.—Two hundred and twenty-one churches in Canada up to last night had voted to enter church union. Twenty-three had voted in opposition.

Church union headquarters reported that during the day and up to midnight tonight results from 47 congregations had been received. Of these, 25 voted for entering the United Church and 12 voted non-concurrence.

All the returns from Saskatchewan were unanimous for union.

Of the 26 reported from Ontario, 11 voted against union. The outstanding votes against union were from Erskine church, Ottawa, and Alma street church, St. Thomas.

CITY CHURCHES REPORT.

By overwhelming majorities two of London's foremost Presbyterian congregations, First and St. Andrew's, have decided to enter the United Church of Canada on June 10 next.

King street church, which is the largest of the city churches, has voted by a similar "cordial" majority.

St. Paul's, West London, and Hyde Park, both under the charge of Rev. J. A. MacFarlane, have also decided to enter the United Church without taking a formal vote on the question.

Results from Knox and St. James churches will be known tonight, and from Chalmers church tomorrow night.

Hamilton road, Wilton Grove and St. George's congregations have yet to vote on the question.

Vote is 1423 to 463.

The recapitulation for the five city congregations, in which the voting was brought to a close last night, after the regulation two-week voting period, shows that of the 1,385 votes cast 1,423 were for the individual churches, and 463 were against such action.

The vote in the First church stood 356 for union to 58 against, or a total of 414 votes cast out of 513 members on the church roll.

In King Street church the vote stood 253 for union to 73 against, or a total of 424 votes cast out of 500 members on the church roll.

St. George's church, under its pastor, Rev. John Housie, B.A., voted not to enter the union by a vote of 13 to 107, on a total of 120 out of 136 members on the church roll.

Knollwood Park church, under W. Smith, voted not to enter the union by a vote of 1 to 79, or a total of 80 out of 81 members on the roll.

First Church Leads.

First church had a slight edge, however, since 86 per cent of the vote polled was in favor of union and 82 per cent of the total number of members on the roll cast their ballots.

In St. Andrew's church 84.5 per cent of the vote polled was in favor of union and 78 per cent of the members on the roll cast their ballots.

Speaking to The Advertiser last night upon the result of the vote in the city churches, Rev. (Col.) William Beattie, D.D., C.M.G., likewise chairman of the presbytery committee on church union, made the following statement: "We feel it a great source of satisfaction that the vote was so decisive, since it makes easier the task of the future. It is not anticipated that any of those who voted against union will withdraw from First church, as many have expressed themselves as desirous of continuing to worship in their old church. I take great pleasure in the vote indicated and represented very well the sentiments of the active membership of the church. I have always been in sympathy with union," concluded Dr. McIntosh, "because I feel that we ought to come together in a new country, abolish all enmity and eliminate all waste of men and money to bring in the Kingdom of God on earth."

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TAX OFFICE OF
WILL BE SPEEDY

Collector Sees Efficient Feat Brought to Light at Handling of Rush Crowds With Stub System.

Greater speed in the handling of rush crowds at the tax office is expected when the new stub system of giving receipts is put into effect. Stationery is now being printed and will be ready for the first installment of taxes in the spring.

The present system of making receipts necessitates waiting with carbon copies as the citizen waits in front of the tax office wicket. If the taxpayer is making payments on a half down lots of property, he must wait while all these are tabulated and written on a receipt form.

Under the stub system, a complete account is sent to the citizen. When he comes in with this paper, the man at the wicket simply receipts the bill, tears off a portion marked for the first, second or third installment or all, and hands the taxpayer's half of the bill back.

It is expected that while much time will be taken in preparing these accounts, greater speed will be possible in handling of rush crowds three or four times as quickly as is the case now.

In addition a cumbersome system of filing will be done away with, as the accounts will be kept in one place and records will be accurate.

At the same time, we cannot hope to make tax collections any more efficient than the present system. It is usually left after the first of the year. There always will be that element to contend with in this year's taxes.
