The despatch says:-"Mr. Frank Barker stated that the invaders told him that they intended to seize the Credit Lyonnais offices and explode a bomb there. It was part of their plan to raid the Voivoida police station at the same time. The bombs were to be exploded at the police station simultaneously with the attack upon the Credit Lyonnais. However, the men detailed for the attack on the Credit Laonnais at Constantinople had nothing to do with the killing of the Armenians. The mobs consisted entirely of the lowest classes of Constantinople, and its suburbs, Lazzaroni, the Kurea, and the men who work along the
