The bureau was first established in 1882 and inspectors appointed all over the country.

Dixon, formerly in the city treasurer's office at Halifax; John Brown and Tom Gibbons, two working jewelers; an engraver named Dunward; Arthur Edgar, a machinist; and Charles Dumnick, a somewhat adventurous rover who, like the Hutton-Payne party, was a passenger by steamer Alpha, arriving from the North this morning.
