## BRITISH TOWNS ELECT COUNCILS

Laborites Have Most Candidates In England and Wales.

## HOUSING IS BIG ISSUE

National Politics Injected Into Municipal Fight.

LONDON, Nov. 1.—More than 300 municipalities in England and Wales today elected councillors to replace the one-third of the total number of representatives who retire annually. The feature of the present contest is the strenuous effort being made by Laborites and Socialists to retrieve the reversals suffered by them during the past two years and to increase their representation beyond any point which they have hitherto attempted.

The main issues upon which they have built their campaign are unemployment and the housing shortage, but as their policy on these questions entails a considerable outlay of public expense they are meeting with hot opposition.

These annual contests are nominally confined to matters of municipal interest, but actually a good deal of national politics is injected and the candidates appeal to their electorates under the names of the national parties. As the country just now is flooded with talk of a possible general election, the future of to-day's municipal contests will be regarded more than ever before as showing the trend of political sympathies.

The energy which the Labor and Socialist parties have bestowed upon the campaign is shown partly by the fact that their candidates greatly outnumber those of any other party. The Communists, who are running many candidates this year than ever before, are classed with the Laborites and Socialists, whose nominations thus reinforced their 623. The Conservatives have 648, the Liberals 217 and the Independents 328.

Conservatives In Britain Confident They Will Win Election.

## LABOR SETTING POLICY

Will Possibly Demand Capital Levy and Aid For Emigration.

LONDON, Nov. 1.—Results of recent by-elections in Yeovil and Kintland have convinced Conservative leaders and members that a general election in the immediate future will assure a victory for their party. January is freely mentioned as the probable date of the Government's appeal to the country.

Certainly should the protectionists within the Cabinet gain control an intensive campaign will be begun immediately following the election. The proposed Conservative policy is based upon imposition of customs tariff on manufactured and semi-manufactured goods according to the value of various British industries. Food taxes have not been proposed as yet but some concession probably in the form of a bonus bill will be granted to the agricultural interests in order to maintain production in the face of existing wage and unemployment conditions. It is suggested that subvention of £1 per acre be granted on all cultivated lands.

Opposition within the Cabinet to the policy of protection is not without a minority, but an influential one. Lord Salisbury is certainly opposed, as well as the Duke of Devonshire. Right Hon. C. G. D. Amery, however, is in favor of the policy. The protectionists are the leaders of the protectionists. The attitude of the Labor party will be made clear in a manifesto which will probably be issued after the election. The trade union congress which will undoubtedly result in a call upon its members to support a capital levy and a state-aided emigration policy to relieve unemployment. Mr. Clynes outlines Labor's attitude toward protection by his recent declaration that the policy will never prove a remedy for unemployment anywhere.

## NO FORMAL PROTEST OF RHINELAND REPUBLIC

Special Cable to London Free Press. LONDON, Nov. 1.—The French and Belgian Governments to Premier Baldwin's declaration that the English could not permit the disruption of Germany. It is assumed here that this is the basis of Paris reports that England has protested against the proclamation of the Rhineland Republic.

## ROB DRUG STORE FOR SUPPLY OF MORPHINE

OTTAWA, Nov. 1.—Apparently driven into a frenzy through the difficulty of getting narcotic drugs illegally as a result of the activities of the R. C. M. P., thieves broke into the Elgin street branch of Denman & Munro's drug stores here on Monday night and stole narcotic drugs valued at nearly \$1,000, bootleggers say.

The Journal this morning, however, says nothing else being touched. The burglary is regarded in local police circles as one of the most daring in recent years. The drugs taken consisted of morphine and heroin.

## ACCEPT SAPRU'S PLAN FOR INDIANS

Britain To Consult Government of Indian When Necessary.

## STATUS NOT SETTLED

Recognition of Treaty Rights May Be Given.

LONDON, Nov. 1.—(Canadian Press Cable.)—It is learned that no resolution was adopted by the imperial conference on the Indian question, but that the result of the debate was embodied in a formula in which the Duke of Devonshire, on behalf of his majesty's Government, accepted the Sapru proposal that there should be a full consultation and discussion between the colonial secretary and a committee to be appointed by the Government of India on all questions affecting British Indians domiciled in the colonies, protectorates or mandated territories.

At the same time the Duke of Devonshire was careful to make it clear that no decisions are taken as a result of discussions of the proposed committee, consultations with the local Government are concerned, and in some cases local inquiry will be necessary.

While further welcoming the proposal, the Duke of Devonshire reminded the conference that the Government had recently come to certain decisions regarding Kenya Colony, which represented, in their considered view, the very best that could be done in all the circumstances.

While the Duke of Devonshire saw no prospect of these decisions being modified, he would give careful attention, he said, to such representations as the British Empire would be expected to make to the Government of India.

## ARGO-ARMY GAME IS BIG SATURDAY FEATURE

NEW YORK, Nov. 1.—(Canadian Press Cable.)—"Diamonds as big as footballs" was the headline of Saturday's New York Herald when it declared the game scheduled between the Argos and the Third Army Corps 11 one of the most interesting of Saturday's sports.

Discussing the forthcoming contest, he says: "The Argos are champions at the rugby game and believe that with their speed, their lateral smokes, and their kicking game they will be able to take the measure of the army stars, who on Saturday proved their class by defeating Georgetown 14 to 0."

"The press of England at the present moment," the countess says in her letter, "consists of a group of rich men, who have bought power, and speak of words of piffle, in which the opening meeting was reported. She continues: "I cannot help the press reporting to suit their papers, but I have been followed and surrounded by these gentlemen, and I have no time to spare. I should like to see them with the trouble of coming near me, I need no publicity."

"The countess still remains away from her constituency, although her supporters and their opponents are working feverishly."
