GRAPHITE AS A LUBRICANT

NEW YORK, October 18.—An nouncement that he had a successful converted artificial graphite, made from coal dust, into such a condition that it would pass through the finest filter paper and that he had succeeded in dissolving graphite in water, in other words making it colleidable, was made by E. C. Acheson, "the wizard of Niagara Falls," at the opening session of the twelfth general meeting of the American Electro Chemical Society last evening.

Both of these discoveries will have a wide application in industry, it was said, especially that of the dissolution of graphite an water, for it can be used successfully now as a lubricant, where heretofore when dissolved in oil it has formed a sediment at the bottom, resulting in much waste. The graphite is much cheaper
