CHINESE CHEATING. - Admiral Sir Thomas Brouchier has been holding a Court of Enquiry on hoard II. M. S. Poictiers, at Chatham, to examine the captain and officers of the Iris, recently arrived with a part of the money paid by the Chinese for breaking some of our countrymen's heads. Upon opening one of the chests supposed to be filled with silver to the amount of £1000, it was discovered to be filled with lead. The chests were strongly clasped down so as to resemble the other chests. No doubt exists as to the knavery of the Chinese and that the one was substituted by them for the other. Captain Mundy, who commanded the Iris, received the chests from the Vixen.

STEAM-BOAT EXPLOSION ON THE THAMES .- On Friday, the 27th ult., a frightful steam-boat explosion took place near the Hungerford-bridge pier. The Cricket steamer, which plies from the Strand to London-bridge, at the low fare of one halfpenny per head, was about to leave the pier, for her second trip, about 10 o'clock a.m., when the explosion took place. It is supposed that from 70 to 100 passengers were on hoard at the time. Five persons are ascertained to have been killed, and fourteen were taken to the Charing-cross Hospital more or less injured. The ill-fated vesse! was one of the three. -the Ant, Bee, and Cricket-which ply on the Thames, and which profess to be low-pressure engines, but work at 36lbs, on the square inch. They have long ago been pointed out as dangerous boats; but since the accident they have been as crowded as ever, the low faces being so great a temptation with the multitude in London. The inquest on the bodies of the sufferers has not as yet returned a verdict upon this melancholy case.

Two orrice-Bearers or consequence.- The Independance, of Brussels, gives the following amusing scene, atising out of the late change of the Belgian Ministry :- A few days ago, one of the new Ministers went to the hotel of his Ministry, and desired to be shown into the cabinet. The person to whom he addressed himself replied, "The Minister is not there." "That may be, but show me the cabinet." "I repeat. Sir, there is nobody in it, and therefore—." Pardon me, you do not understand me. I do not ask for the Minister, but his cabinet." "I understand you perfectly; but when the Minister is absent I cannot, and will not, show you into his cabinet." "You are determined?" "Quite determined." "You are very strict, it appears; it may be right, but pray tell me who you are." 6 Who am 12 1 am the hotel, Sir," said the person questioned, drawing himself up, and assuming all the dignity of a man in office: he was in truth the person in charge of the place, and had no knowledge of the new Minister's person. He was somewhat discomnosed. when the apparent intruder replied : " And I am the Misisten; be pleased to show me the way to

In addition to the melancholy instances of crime committed by persons of high rank in France, of which intelligence was received by last mail, we have to mention the suicide of Count Alfred de Mont squion, a nobleman belonging to one of the to Payne's Hutel. first families in the kingdom. He was 53 years old, the husband of a wealthy American lady, and father of 7 or 8 children. The criminal act was committed with an Indian knife, on the 27th of last month, and the causes which have led to it were still involved in obscurity.

Pontugat .- The British, French, and Spanish Ambassadors having called upon the Portuguese Government to fulfit the stipulations of the protocol, by virtue of which they had interfered and brought the late insurrection to a close, attempts have been made by the Queen to evade the conditions which had been agreed to by her, and still to keep in power that party which is so obnoxious to the nation as to have caused the outbreak. Determined remonstrances have, however, caused the dismissal of the ministry, but no satisfaction had as yet been given by the appointment of popular men to guide the affairs of the nation. Prospects were by no means cheering: the capital indeed was tranquil, but the provinces were in a frightfully disordered state. The Cortes having been convoked, active preparations were made for the approaching elections.

EMIGRATION .- By the official notice from the Emigration Office it will be observed, that no less than Fourteen Thousand One Hundred and Seventynine emigrants have landed at this port the present season. Among the recent arrivals are many aged and worn out people, besides widows and orphans who have been sent out at the expense of their former landlords, to relieve the estates from the expense of supporting them under the new Poor Law for Ireland. The passengers by the Lady Sale from Sligo, 400 in number, were in part only from the estate of Sir Robert Gore Booth, Bt., about 200 being from the estate of Lord Palmerston. A more miserable set of people were never cast upon our shores, many of them nearly naked and almost all in the utmost destitution. A very considerable number of aged and infirm people, old and helpless women, and scores of orphans, must go immediately from the Lady Sale to the Alms House to be fed and clothed at the public expense. This is an intolerable outrage upon this community; but as the matter is now under the consideration of the Executive, we trust measures will be adopted to remedy the existing evil, and prevent a recurrence of the like in future .- New Brunswick Courier.

MAIL-RODBERY .- We understand that the Canada Mail has been systematically rebbed on its way through this Province, and that the place of robbery has been traced to Dalhousie. The Post-Master of that place becoming acquainted with the inquiries that were being made, and fearing the consequence, absconded to the States-he was however followed and overtaken at Bangor, where he was arrested, and since brought back to this City.—St. John's Loyalist.

POSTAL ARRANGEMENTS .- " Under the new arrangement, -or rather the abrogation of the present arrangements, there will be no accounts kent between the Post Offices of Canada and those of the United States. All correspondence and matter transmitted by mail, of whatever description, will have to be prepaid, in both countries, to their respective boundaries. At present, we must prepay letters from Canada to the United States as far as the lines; although letters from the United States may be transmitted to Canada without being prepaid; but, from the period mentioned, all corres- breceived his death-wound.

pondence, &c., mailed in the United States for Canada, must also be prepaid to the lines. In neither country can the portion of the postage of letters pertaining to the other he pre-paid.

"In corresponding with Europe, via the United States, under the approaching system, letters from Canada, will have to be enclosed to some agent at the port from which the vessel by which the letters are to be sent, takes her departure, to be post-paid by that agent, before dispatching them. This follows as a consequence of what has taken place, and will occasion inconvenience, particularly to mercantile correspondents, to obviate which, they must avail themselves of the best private arrangements

in their power.
"We learn further that the Liverpool and Halifax Royal Mail Steamers are not to extend their voyage o Boston, after the 1st November; but we presume that in the summer season there will be a steamer placed on the route, between Pictou and Quebec, as was the case when the Atlantic Steamships were first established, by which means the correspon-dence, &c., for Canada, will be forwarded more expeditiously than by the ordinary land route. For public convenience it may be that some enterprising persons at Halifax or elsewhere, will place a line of steamers on the route between Halifax and Boston, to connect with the British Mail Line; if not the passengers will select their vessels, in passing between America and Europe, and the probability is, that the French and American Steamers to and from New York, will have the preference, particuarly in the winter season, when there are so many difficulties in the way of proceeding between Halffax and any other part of America."-Toronto Colonist.

As regards the French Atlantic steamers mentioned in the above, their management must greatly improve before they can compele with. English and American conveyance. The passengers have sadly complained both of detention from want of coal, and of bad provisions and accommodation. It is reported -- perhaps waggishly-that a passenger, on the return voyage of one of them, being asked by one of the officers what he had in three strange looking bags which composed part of his luggage, gave for answer "coal-to help you out, in case you should get short of it on the passage."

VISIT OF THE GOVERNOR GENERAL TO

QUEBEC .- [Thursday the 23id inst.] This morning, shortly after six o'clock, the Royal Mad Steamer Montreal, came into port, having on board His Execliency the Earl of Elgin, the Counters of Elgin, the Lady Alice Lambton, and suite. As the disembarkation was not to take place until about nine, her freight was discharged at the usual place, when she proceeded to the Government Wharf, with her distinguished passengers. At 9 Pelock His Excellency landed under a salute from the citadel, and was received by His Honor the Mayor and the Members of the City Council, the Magistrates, Heads of Departments, and by a Guard of Honour of the 93rd Highlanders, a company of whom with the band of the regiment, were drawn up on the wharf, and presented arms as His Excellency stepped on shore. The procession then moved onwards, through St. Peter and Mountain Streets,

An address was then presented to His Excellency by the Mayor, on behalf of the citizens, which, owing to the lateness of the hour, we are prevented from giving this morning.

The only drawback on the occasion was the weather. It had been threatening rain all the morning, but before the ceremony was over, it was coming down heavily.—Nevertheless, there was an immense concourse present, who loudly cheered as the procession moved along.

The national Societies mustered very strong; and upon the whole His Excellency must have been much gratified with the demonstrations of loyalty and respect evinced by the good citizens of Quebec, taking into consideration the very sudden announcement of his intended visit to us .- Chronicle of Thursday.

Soon after His Excellency's arrival, addresses were presented by the Magistrates, the Societies of St. Patrick, St. George, and St. Jean Baptiste, and the Fire Companies. The address from the latter contained a request, that His Excellency would cause the Fire Companies of Quebec to be organised as a Militia Battalion, in the same manner as the Companies at the seat of Government, Montreal. The City Council presented their address at 2 o'clock. His Excellency acknowledged all of them by kind and gracious replies; assuring the Fire Companies that their request should be "considered with the attention due to the wishes of the

On Suturday morning, there was a grand review of the 93rd Highlanders and the Rifle Brigade, on the plains of Abraham. Lord and Lady Elgin were on the spot, and great satisfaction was expressed by His Excellency who, while the troops were marching back to barracks, turned aside to look at the spot where the gallant General Wolfe

A lovee was held on the same day, at I past one o'clock, in the Parliament Buildings, at which up-wards of three hundred Gentlemen had the honour of a presentation. The Board of Trade were admitted to present an address, after the Levee. The Countess of Elgin held a drawing-room, in Payne's Hotel, on Monday last, which commenced

Lord Elgin visited the Lunatic Asylum and the Citadel on Monday, and the Huron village of Jenne Lorette on Thursday. His Excellency's visit to this city was brought to a close yesterday by his embarking on board the Quebec on his return to the seat of Government. Suitable military honours were paid on his embarkation.
