In the centre of a very large area of land railed in like a park, is a thick plantation of fir and alder trees; the different mills being placed some distance from each other in and around this plantation, so as to leave a considerable space between each filled up by this copie so dense as to be almost impeuetrable. The explosion commenced in this mill, which contained from 80.1 to 900 cet. of gunpowder, and, in probability the cause will never be ascertained, as the ten men at work to it at the time were literally blown to pieces, and the building torn up even to the foundation, of which not a brick remained. A blackened hole in the earth marked the op-t where it about. The trees around were torn to pieces, those mearest the mill being loaded with small fragments, and those distant from it having the small tragments, and more quant from it having the bark and branches stripped; for one hundred yards round were to be seen the debris of the building, the trees, and the machinery. The streeoud facing of the counting house was severed from the brickwork underneath, and broken to pieces; in fact, not a building on the grounds has escaped without damage, either from the explosion itself or the concussion. Although these are its principal objects, the advantages of the Society are nevertheless fully open to all parties desirous of investing funds therein with a view to the acquisition of freehold or leasehold property, the removal of incumbrances or liabilities upon property already held by them, or the benefit of receiving the amount of their shares in advance upon furnishing good mortgage accurity.

Yound as a means of raising money on real property, the advantageous working of these Societies has been already ably and clearly demonstrated by former writers, and the public mind is too well informed on the subject to require a lengthened dissertative.

They possess to a certain degree the two-fold character of a Savings' Bank and an ordinary Banking establishment. Like the Savings' Bank, they create a capital by the accu-

Like the Savings' Bank, they create a capital by the accumulation of small sums periodically past in and set out at interest; like the ordinary Banking establishment, they advance money by way of loan, but on real in place of personal security; more productive than the former, through the privileges secured to them by law; better protected than the latter, in proportion as real is superior

to personal security.

The interest paid by Savings' Banks on deposits in limited to five per cent., those Institutions being restricted in their investments to Bank Stock and Government bein their investments to Bank Stock and Government be-bentures; while the premiums permitted by Statutory emactment to be received by Building Societies, in making loans to their Stockholders, mase the average of interest in favour of the depositor with the latter to ten and twelve

per cent.
