PRAYERS.

Seven Petitions were laid on the Table.

The Clerk of the House laid upon the Table the Third Report of the Clerk of Petitions stating that he had examined the Petitions presented on the 31st instant, and finds that all the requirements of Standing Order 68 have been complied with in each case. The said Petitions were then read and received, and are as follows:—

Of Saint John River Storage Company; praying for the passing of an Act to ratify, confirm, and re-enact the provisions of its act of incorporation, in so far as the Parliament of Canada has jurisdiction to do so.—Sir Eugene Fiset.

Of The Canadian Pacific Railway Company; praying for the passing of an Act to construct a branch line of railway from Acme, Alberta, for a distance of 25 miles in a northerly and northwesterly direction; also a branch line from Rosemary North Branch in township 21, range 15, west of the fourth meridian in a northwesterly direction.—Mr. Speakman.

Of Robert MacKenzie and others; praying for the passing of an Act to incorporate them under the name of "The Port Huron and Sarnia Bridge Company."—Mr. Odette.

Of The Manitoba and North Western Railway Company of Canada; praying for the passing of an Act to extend the time for the completion of its railway at or near Tuffnell, Saskatchewan.—Mr. McLean (Melfort).

Of Canadian Cinch Anchoring Systems Limited; praying for the passing of an Act to extend the term of duration of their patent No. 139,885.—Mr. Jacobs.

Of The Interprovincial and James Bay Railway; praying for the passing of an Act to extend the time for the commencement of its line of railway from Ville Marie, Quebec, to a northerly and northeasterly direction to the headwaters of the Nottaway River, County of Abitibi, Quebec.—Mr. Parent.

Of Edward Bennett of Toronto, Ontario; praying for the passing of an Act to declare his marriage with Florence Bennett of Toronto, Ontario, to be dissolved, and that he be divorced from her.—Mr. Anderson (Toronto-High Park).
