On motion of the Honourable Senator Robertson, it was-

Ordered, That when the Senate adjourns to-day, it do stand adjourned until to-morrow at eleven o'clock in the forenoon.

The Order of the Day being called for resuming the adjourned debate on the inquiry by the Honourable Senator Dupuis—That he will call the attention of the Senate to the desirability of establishing a national organization in co-operation with all the Provincial Governments whose functions would be to help mothers, to develop infant health and to reduce to its minimum infantile mortality, it was—

Ordered, That the said Order of the Day be postponed until to-morrow.

The Order of the Day being called for resuming the adpourned debate on the inquiry by the Honourable Senator Johnston calling the attention of the Senate to certain matters relating to the historical and constitutional position of this Honourable House, its functions and its record within the scope of the responsibilities assigned to this Honourable House under our Constitution, it was—

Ordered, That the said Order of the Day be postponed until to-morrow.

It being six o'clock, the Honourable the Speaker left the Chair to resume the same at eight o'clock.

8 p.m.

The Senate resumed.

A Message was brought from the House of Commons by their Clerk with a Bill (238), intituled: "An Act for Carrying into Effect the Agreements for an International Monetary Fund and an International Bank for Reconstruction and Development", to which they desire the concurrence of the Senate.

The said Bill was then read the first time.

The Honourable Senator Robertson then moved that the Bill be now read a second time.

After debate-

The Honourable Senator Haig moved that further debate on the motion for the second reading of the Bill be adjourned until Monday, next.

The question being put on the said motion.

The Senate divided as follows:-

Yeas, 9. Nays, 28.

So it was passed in the negative.

The question being again put on the motion for the second reading of the Bill.

It was resolved in the affirmative.

The said Bill was then read the second and third times.
