hope that when individual members of the Canadian Institute were visiting England they would make a point of calling at Chatham House soon after their arrival in London. Those who did so would recoive regularly the list of meetings to be held at Chatham House, and all the other facilities of the Royal Institute would be placed at their disposal during their stay. He suggested that individual members of the Canadian Institute might care to make greater use of the Information Department of Chatham House, and he mentioned that a good deal of bibliographical work was being carried out in the Library, and that the Institute would be happy to assist members of the Canadian Institute in this respect also. Further mention was made of memoranda on International problems produced from time to time by the Information Department, and also of the "Bulletin of International News", a fortnightly publication, available to members of the public at 15/-, and to members of the Canadian and Royal Institutes at 5/- per annum.

5. Reviewing of Books for "International Affairs" - The Journal of the Institute.

The question of Canadian members reviewing books (for the Journal of the Royal Institute) was discussed. It was considered that in certain cases (e.g. certain French books) direct arrangements for such reviews might be arranged through the Montreal Branch. In such cases the ordinary arrangement that the book or books be retained by the reviewer would prevail. Mr. Macadam said that in the ordinary course, the reviewing of books for the Institute Journal was made through the Secretary of the Research Committee of the Canadian Institute, namely Professor Norman MacKenzie of Toronto.

6. Annual Year of Chatham House.

On being questioned as to the annual year of the Royal Institute, Mr. Macadam pointed out that it ended on the 30th June, and has always done so. Accordingly a similar year for the Canadian Institute would be desirable and convenient, but of course not essential.
