Dear Sir Arthur:

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I have seen Mr. Scott, the Editor-in-Chief of the Gazette and, as I expected, found him entirely friendly to McGill. He points out that the report of your address was curtailed considerably because of its publication in full in the Star of the night before and therefore a repetition the following day has not, of course, the same newspaper value. Notwithstanding this, however, he thinks that the report was unduly curtailed.

He has pointed out to me that of necessity the evening newspapers sometimes have a distinct advantage over the Gazette in obtaining news of McGill activities, The meetings of our Governors, which are usually followed by announcements of interest to the public, are held in the morning and therefore the news is available for the afternoon editions. These disabilities, which are incident to the time of publication, he attaches no importance to but he thinks that in other announcements no discrimination should be exerted as between the Gazette and its competitors.
