My dear Sir Arthur Currie: -You were kind enough to request that I hand you some information in regard to the Wharton School of Finance and Commerce of the University of Pennsylvania. I am sending you the Announcement printed last year. An Announcement for the coming year is at the printers and the copy can be sent to you in two or three weeks. I also enclose the brief Announcement regarding the Graduate Course in Business Administration, a two years' course leading to the degree of Master of Business Administration that we have established within the Graduate School organization of the University. This is the first year of that course. The Wharton School is in its forty-first year. It is a four years' under-graduate course, the requirements for admission being those required of students for admission to the under-graduate work at the University of Pennsylvania. During the Freshman year, all students take the same subjects as set forth on page 24 of the Announcement. At the end of the Freshman year students are required to enroll in the "group" that they wish to pursue during the three remaining years. About half of the students take the "general" course, the other half dividing themselves among the several groups:-Accounting, Brokerage, etc., described on pages 26 to 40 of the Announcement. The enrollment this year was 2,587 at the beginning of the year. Our purpose is to keep our enrollment at about 2,400, that being as many students as we can accommodate. This year and the year before, we were obliged to turn away hundreds of students who were qualified to enter the Wharton School. Any further information you may desire, I will be pleased to attempt to give. It was a real pleasure for those of us connected with the University to meet you and hear you yesterday.
