Dear Dean Laird:

Your letter of January 24th regarding principles involved in what transpired at the meetings of the Executive Committee held on December 19th, 1927, and January 16th and 23rd, 1928, is a little difficult to answer.

Generally speaking, if the statement made by the student had been true, it would have been quite proper to discuss the matter at the meeting of the Executive Committee, because if the College had bought material at thirty cents a yard and sold it at eighty cents a yard there would have been a justifiable complaint, and the fairness of the College authorities challenged. One can see well that such a challenge, if substantiated, would affect adversely the reputation and esprit de corps of the College. But the statement was not true and after the student had made his correction, I think the matter should be allowed to drop as far as the Executive Committee
