GUARANTEE AUTONOMY OF OUTER MONGOLIA

Envoys of Russia, China and Mongolia Sign Tripartite Treaty. LONDON, June 7, 11.25 p.m.—A Reuters despatch from Petrograd says that the special envoys of Russia, China and Mongolia signed today at Khabarovsk a tripartite treaty regarding the autonomy of Outer Mongolia. The treaty was signed on after a conference that has lasted for nearly a year. By the terms of the agreement China will retain a nominal suzerainty over Mongolia, but neither China nor Russia will interfere with the administration of Mongolia's internal affairs.

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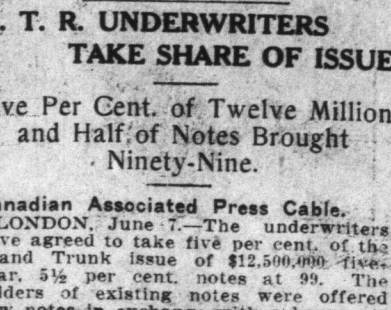

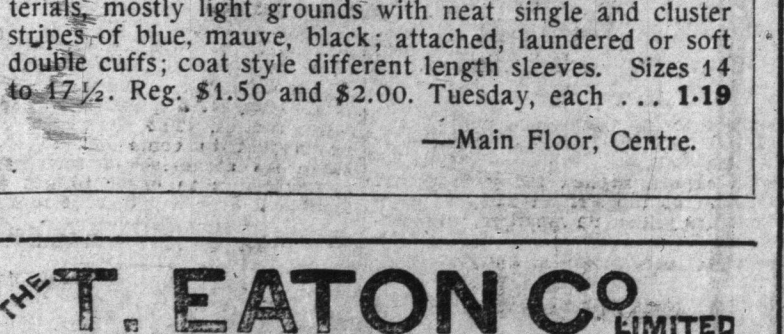
