

Fleet of One Hundred and Fifty Craft Will Meet Sir Wilfrid and Escort Him to Montreal. MONTREAL, July 7.-Details of Montreal's welcome to Sir Wilfrid Laurier are now officially complete. The premier and his party will leave Sorel Monday about four o'clock and proceed up the river direct to Mont-real, being met on their way by a flotilla of tugs and pleasure craft. This fleet will include about 150 craft, flluminated and decorated. Illumina. tions and fireworks on both shores of the river will mark the progress of

the premier's vessel. The harbor will be illuminated in the most complete fashion. A triumphal arch will be erected at the point of debarkation, and the various vessels n port will be decorated in honor of the occasion.

The city council will attend in a ody, and Ald. Gauvin, acting mayor, will read the city's address of welcome. Meanwhile, the Liberal clubs, with bands and thousands of banners, will cross the Champ de Mars, pass down Jacques Cartier-square, and take up a position on either side of the thoro-

Immediately after the reply Sir Wilfrid, the civic authorities and other dignitaries in carriages, will leave the wharf by Commissioners-street to Jacques Cartier-square, and thence to the platform on the edge of the Champ de Mars.

The ascent of Jacques Cartier-square will take place under a dome of light, formed by a series of inscriptions sixty feet long and four feet high, covering the entire width of the street. On each side of the square hanging decora-tions will be displayed. The Champ de Mars will be similarly illuminated.
