MASONS START CAMPAIGN TO FINISH BUILDING

The campaign of the board of directors of the Masonic Temple Corporation to raise \$75,000 by the issue of ten-year 5 1/2 per cent. gold bonds, for the purpose of finishing and furnishing the new building on Yonge street and Davenport road, made a most auspicious start last night, bonds to the amount of \$12,250 being sold in the room following the banquet.

There are 25 teams altogether, and that captained by Ald. J. R. Beamish had the honor of handing in the largest amount, his total being well over \$200.

The general chairman was J. Ross Robertson, while E. J. Hockenbury was campaign manager.

The five divisional chairmen were: J. McKnight, R. F. Segsworth, C. Bulley, O. P. McGregor and E. W. Howell. Today the real campaign starts and the general feeling of the workers is extremely optimistic and every one is of the opinion that the total amount of bonds will be easily sold.

The estimated cost of the building in this instance, not including the furnishings, was about \$220,000, but the amount has not been exceeded and now stands at about \$250,000.

For his expenditure the financing has had many is of the opinion that the brethren who subscribed for had to go overseas, while others, thru unforeseen financial circumstances, had to ask for an extension of time, and in consequence something over \$80,000 remains unpaid on stock subscriptions. It is for the collecting of this that the campaign has been inaugurated.

The various campaigns of the teams will report progress every evening at campaign headquarters, and every worker most enthusiastic in the carrying of the campaign to a successful conclusion.

AN ALLEGED DELAY CAUSES BIG SUIT

Before Justice Middleton in the non-jury assizes yesterday the Canadian Alliance-Chalmers Co. was suing the Packard Fuse Co. of St. Catharines for \$60,962, claimed on three promissory notes given by the defendants last August to the Architectural Bronze and Iron Works, who endorsed them to the plaintiffs. In defence it was claimed that the notes were given in payment of \$75,000 brass firmings for fuse bodies which the Architectural Bronze and Iron Works, they allege, agreed to supply at the rate of \$,000 a day. They claim that the contract was rendered void by delay in the supplying of the firmings, and counter-claim for \$150,000 damages.

DISCUSS NEW FIRE LIMITS.

Smith, chief of the fire department, was appointed at yesterday's session of the committee to investigate and report upon the advisability of extending the present fire limits.
