#### AN ALLEGED DELAY

Before Justice Middleton in the non-jury assizes yesterday the Canadian Allis-Chalmers Co. was suing the Packard Fuse Co. of St. Catharines for \$60,962, claimed on three promissory notes given by the defendants last August to the Architectural Bronze and Iron Works, who endorsed them to the Canadian General Electric Co., by whom they were endorsed to the plaintiffs.
