Mr. McCallum was the choice of the convention on the second ballot. Three North York Conservatives aspired for the honor of opposing Hon. A. B. Aylesworth in this contest—T. H. Brunton. JURY GIVES HIM BENEFIT OF DOUBT

Mr. Johnston's Argument Was Along the Lines of Putting Blame on Bremner-Judge Remarks on Harryett's Sunday Trip.

Belleville, Nov. 1 .- (Special.) -- The conspiracy case against Sam Harryett, while police magistrate at Bancroft, ended this afternoon in a verdict of acquittal, which was generally expected after the way three witnesses, Weese, Kelly and Harryett himself, had gone into the witness box and denied in tota the story told by Bremner.

The first witness this morning was John O. Bremner, son of the chief witness for the prosecution, who testified to hearing Sam Harryett tell his father that a box was coming by express for him (Harryett) and asking him, when the box came, to put it in his (Harry-ett's) office. The day the box came he

He thought he heard his father tell Harryett that the box nad arrived, James Irwin was the next witness. He lived at Bancroft and knew Harryett and Byron O. Lott and had often seen them together. The night betoge the nomination he (witness) was with Harryett and they met Lott. Harryett asked Lott, "What about Bremner?" Lott repiled, "Well, he spoiled the whole damned job."

That closed the crown's case. George Weese of Bancroft was the first witness for the defence. He had kept hete at Bancroft and knew that Bremner was president of the Liberal Association. Weese said he was one of the party who met Bremner at the Somerset House in Toronto when they, went into a private room, and denied that anybody had ever tried to persuade Bremner not to tell the truth, or that he had told Bremner to kiss his thumb instead of the Bible. Nothing was ever said by anybody about the ballot boxes or anything connected with them. The was a straight denial of Bremner's evidence, Had Never Heard.
