In doing so he referred to its complex and intricate character. The Land Act of 1881, he added, had initiated an agrarian revolution, transforming the system of land tenura. During the past 15 years there had been a reduction of agricultural values that nobody in 1881 expected. This had added to the difficulty of the issues involved in a settlement of the land question. The keystone of the Unionist policy since 1881 had been to establish a peasant proprietary in Ireland and a single instead of dual ownership of land.

Regarding compensation for improvements, the bill provided that after an allowance had been made to a tenant for improvements. the court could

for improvements, the court could award a further compensation if it de-cided that the tenant had not received equitable compensation.

The scheme for fixing the judicial rents proposed a term of 30 years' duration, but this would be variable every five years on the application of either landlord or tenant. The land commission could also vary the rent under a report of the commissioners, according to the variable of the land, and the effect of such variation upon the fairness of the rent. The landlord and tenant might themselves agree to vary the rent in ratio Fixing the Judicial Rents.
