OSLER IN THE WEST

The President of the Board of Trade Will Run

IF THE CONVENTION WANTS HIM

But He is Opposed to Remedial Legislation.

With Mr. E. F. Clarke as His Rival

Partner the Conservatives will Sweep the Field—Both Strong National Policy Men—What the Liberal Game is in the West Toronto—General News in the World of Active Politics.

Mr. E. B. Osler, senior member of the firm of Osler & Hammond, brokers, and President of the Board of Trade, consented yesterday to stand in the Conservative interests in West Toronto, if he were the choice of the convention. Mr. Osler is a National Policy man, and an anti-Remedialist, and a strong candidate for the riding of Down-town business men are saying that Toronto has not had any representative of her big commercial interests at Ottawa, and that Mr. Osler, if elected, will prove to the Queen City in Parliament what Sir Donald Smith has been to Montreal.

Some are saying that unless E. F. Clarke is offered and accepts the nomination in East Toronto, he will not be Mr. Osler's running partner in the west.

It has been decided not to attempt to secure in the Conservative convention the nomination of any pro-Remedialist for the west.

The plans of the Conservatives for the west are a little indefinite yet, and in view of the fact that both the Conservative candidates are likely to be anti-Remedialists, there may be no third party man put up in that constituency.

It is stated on pretty good authority that the Liberals will put up two men, who will take no definite stand as regards Manitoba, but instead ask the people to rely on Sir Oliver Mowat's assertion that the question can be amicably settled.

At the Albany Club last evening the Liberal-Conservative Association of West Toronto met for organization.

The meeting was largely devoted to the opinion in feeling, and its conclusion the opinion was freely expressed that there was no possible doubt of the election in the west of whatever candidate the Conservatives shall put up.

The feeling seemed to be in favor of the twin of anti-Remedialists, E. F. Clarke and E. B. Osler.

A MCKEIVELY IN WINNIPEG.

Ald. Sproule Will Probably Run—Hugh John Macdonald's Popularity.

Winnipeg, May 6.—(Special)—Before the west is set on fire is likelihood of the political situation in Winnipeg being complicated by the entry of a McCarthyite candidate, Ald. 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TO FIGURE UP MANITOBA.

ASSISTANT STATISTICIAN ST. DENIS GOES TO WINNIPEG.

He Will Ascertain if Mr. Greenway's Estimate is Correct—How the Canadian Government Built Up the Dairying Industry—Prof. Robertson's Wedding—Young Brewer's Mistaken Marriage—Ottawa Notes.

Ottawa, May 6.—(Special)—E. St. Denis, assistant to the Dominion Statistician, leaves for Manitoba in a few days to make arrangements for taking the quinquennial census of the province. Commissioners will be appointed for each of the seven districts and they, as well as the enumerators, will receive their instructions from Mr. St. Denis, who will make his headquarters in Winnipeg. The time for making the enumeration will be fixed on Mr. St. Denis' arrival in Manitoba. The census will be simply one of population, information relating to origin, religious belief, etc. being left over until the decennial census of 1901. The Manitoba Government claim that the present population is 250,000, an increase of 100,000 since 1881. This year's census will demonstrate how correct Mr. Greenway's estimate is.

The Liberals Away East.

A prominent Nova Scotia Grit who was in town to-day admits his party will not make any gains in that province, nor in the Maritime Provinces generally. He concedes that Mr. Greenway will beat Mr. Fraser in Guys-boro.

Inspector Sheppard at Work.

Fisheries Inspector Sheppard, under instructions from the Department, has visited Lake Simcoe to investigate the alleged illegal fishing, especially in Cook's Bay. He reports that some black bass had been illegally taken, but the reports on the whole were exaggerated. The local officers have already made two or three seizures, and with beneficial effect.

The Government Built Up Trade.

The Department of Agriculture has just received the annual report of the Bureau of Animal Industry of the United States. The following significant statement from the pen of Dr. Salmon, chief of the bureau, will be read with interest at this time when the policy of the Dominion Government is on trial: "The dairy industry should receive immediate attention, and efforts should be made to improve the condition by collecting and distributing information on this subject, and in that manner aid our dairy farmers." The results obtained by Canada in this direction are very interesting and instructive. It is not many years since cheese from the United States was puffed in the London markets, and the Canadian Government, however, have made systematic efforts to educate the dairymen of that country. Printed information is sent to dairymen, practical men are sent to demonstrate the improved methods and the importance of making a higher grade of products is constantly taught. The result of these systematic and persistent efforts has wrought such great improvement to Canadian cheese that now it is preferred in the London markets to that of the United States. Canadians have enlarged their foreign market and secured better prices for their products.

Where the Glanders Came From.

According to reports published in the English newspapers the outbreak of glanders in Liverpool is held to be attributable to Canadian horses brought there. At the request of the Minister of Agriculture the matter has been investigated, with the result that it has been clearly demonstrated by Liverpool vets. that the spread of glanders in that city is due to American horses, which are troubled with a pulmonary complaint. This has also affected English horses, and he has no one competent to look after his mines.

Did Blackwell Mean Murder?

The man who shot at Albert Hodgins goes up for trial.

Lucan, May 6.—Freeman Blackwell, the Biddulph farmer, who shot at Albert Hodgins, of this village on May 1st, eluded the officers for three days, but on Monday morning came to town and gave himself up. He was arraigned before Squire Armitage and Justice of the Peace O'Neil, and pleaded not guilty to the charge of shooting with intent to kill. Three witnesses for the prosecution swore to having seen him fire the shot. He was committed to the County Jail, where he will remain until he can be bailed in the amount of \$1500.

Politics in Ottawa.

It is reported around town to-day that Mr. J. R. Booth, the well-known lumberman, will likely be the Conservative candidate for Ottawa. Falling him, the name of Mr. Hiram Robinson is mentioned. Yesterday Mr. Booth, ex-M.P., sent a letter to the Secretary of the McKeivley Association, stating that, inasmuch as the nomination tendered by the body is only representative of a portion of the Conservative party, he cannot see his way to accept it.

Prof. Robertson's Marriage.

The marriage of Prof. Robertson, Agricultural Commissioner, to Miss Mather, daughter of Mr. John Mather, of this city, took place this afternoon. The ceremony was officiated over by Rev. W. T. Herridge. Miss Eva and Miss Jean Mather supported the bride, and Mr. Hunt of New York, a close friend of Prof. Robertson, was groomsmen. The marriage was a quiet one, only the immediate friends of the contracting parties being present, among them being Mr. Robertson, Mr. Fredrickson, father of the groom; Mr. John Robertson of Glasgow, and Mr. Robert Robertson of London, brothers of the bride. A reception was held, a large number of prominent citizens calling upon Mr. and Mrs. Robertson.

General Topics in Brief.

HOLMES HANGS TO-DAY.

MANY ARE ANXIOUS TO WITNESS THE EXECUTION.

Curious People Offering \$200, \$300 and Even as High as \$500 for an Admission Ticket—The Sheriff Will Spring the Trap Himself—The Villain Does Not Want a Post-Mortem on His Remains.

Philadelphia, May 6.—H. H. Holmes, who will be hanged in the county prison to-morrow, for the murder of Benjamin F. Pitel, his fellow-conspirator in the insurance frauds, was wakened last night. With the exception of short naps, sleep has evidently forsaken the condemned man, and his next to last night on earth was largely spent in talking with his death watch, and in reading religious works, his choice of reading is vacillating between the Bible and a petition which he seems to find the greatest consolation in the Bible, he frequently casts that book aside in a petulant manner and picks up a newspaper, in which he has marked articles bearing upon his case.

Mr. Holmes had eaten his breakfast to-day he was visited by Rev. Father Dalley, his spiritual adviser, who was in the cell for some time preparing him for the end to-morrow. Holmes, according to Father Dalley, is fully prepared for his fate, and his numerous crimes he has committed. If Holmes can secure permission, it is said that he will make a statement from the gallows, which will be in the form of a confession and an expression of repentance. It is hardly likely that he will make such a statement, unless a check shall be put upon him. The sheriff prefers to have Holmes make his statement in the cell before the warrant of execution is read to him, and arrangements may be made for his statement in several ways.

The scaffold, upon which several murderers have been executed to-night, is erected about 30 feet from Holmes' cell. Holmes will not see it, however, until he steps from his cell door to begin the death march to-morrow morning. Sheriff Clement has announced that he will not be present at the execution, but will send Holmes out to his cell, where he will be executed.

Holmes has expressed a desire to his attorney, Mr. Rotan, to have his body buried in Philadelphia. The condemned man insists that no autopsy shall be performed. Mr. Rotan has looked upon the law and says that his client's body cannot be touched with the knife without Holmes' consent.

Holmes will receive the sacrament of Holy Communion to-morrow morning from Very Rev. Abner Leont, vicar of the Dominican Order in New York. These clergymen will remain with Holmes from the time of giving him the sacrament until his death.

The execution will take place about five o'clock in the afternoon, and the people will be present. Sheriff Clement has been besieged by several thousand applicants to witness the execution. For the last three days he has been literally driven from his office to escape this mob, and he has had some \$200, some \$300 and some \$500 offered him for a ticket. Those at the hanging will be the Sheriff, the sheriff's officers, the prison officials, the sheriff's jury, and a contingent of 12 prominent business men, a few whom Sheriff Clement has invited and one representative from each of the Philadelphia newspapers and the Press Association.

Mr. Rotan will be present at the execution, and immediately after Holmes is cut down and pronounced dead will claim the body and will not permit post-mortem. Only the death watch

CHAPLEAU IS BACK.

Will Mr. Casgrain be the New Premier of Quebec?

GRAND TRUNK TO REMAIN NEUTRAL

In the Struggle Between the Political Parties.

Montreal, May 6.—(Special)—Hon. J. A. Chapleau arrived in town to-day from Atlantic City, and left for Quebec this evening, where the work of bringing into existence a new Cabinet will be begun. Up to the time of writing, absolutely nothing is known as to the new Ministry, but it is still presumed that Hon. Thomas Chase Casgrain will be the man.

The Grand Trunk is Neutral.

His Honor brings word that Sir Charles Rivers Wilson, whom he met in New York, expressed great surprise to learn that Sir A. P. Caron did not form part of the new Cabinet. The president of the Grand Trunk, in speaking of the coming elections, said his road was a purely non-political institution and would remain strictly neutral during the Federal campaign.

Angers Will Stay in the Senate.

It looks now as if Hon. Mr. Angers would fight through the campaign as a member of the Senate. Your correspondent asked the President of the Council to-day if he intended to seek a constituency, but he replied that the Government needed a leader in the Senate, and it was likely he would remain there for a while at least.

Importers are Kicking.

The importers here and elsewhere are kicking over the fact that the Canadian Pacific and Grand Trunk have increased their through rates for ocean goods, when less than a car load is sent forward, the full car load remaining as before. Some of the importers have complained that they sold goods based on the railway rate of last year, and were consequently down to loss money. Your correspondent interviewed the general traffic managers of the two roads, and their answer was—Messrs. Messrs. Lord of the Grand Trunk and Messrs. Lord of the Canadian Pacific said they regretted that the dealers had made their sales before ascertaining the rates over the railway. They added that the year's tariff expires at the close of navigation, and no one has any possible justification for supposing that the rate for 1896 shall be the same as for 1895.

Latest Political Pointers.

Hon. George A. Nantel headed a deputation that waited to-day upon Hon. L. O. Taillon, and offered the Conservative candidature in Terrebonne to the Hon. Taillon, while Senator Government and a goodly number of representative Conservatives came up from Sorel and tendered the party nomination in Richelieu to the Hon. Alphonse Desjardins. The convention in the last-named county will take place to-morrow, and if the Minister of Public Works does not accept, and decides to stand for Malouine, Mr. E. A. Morgan, advocate of Sorel, will be the Ministerial candidate.

The report is current in Quebec that Sir Charles Langevin will run for Kamouraska, against Mr. Carroll, ex-M.P., and Mr. Louis Tache will run for Sir A. P. Caron's old county, Rimouski.
