

In Old Canada, when the terms of confederation were settled, the provinces got their share, and Ontario received 80 cents per head of population. Each province went into the housekeeping business. The Dominion gives Ontario one and a quarter millions, and the province has to find the remaining three millions. Ontario receives on the basis of 1861, but the Liberals say the population has increased 760,000 since, then, and provision should be made for the increased to the Dominion government, and have based our claim on the growing wants of the province, the schools and the indigent poor. At confederation the province received 24 per cent. The province gave up excise duties to the Dominion, and now we only get 11 per cent. of \$38,000,000. In asking for that money the province it could be so diffused as to reach more people than thru the Dominion government. We can get at the schools, roads, etc., in a way that the Dominion government cannot. It may be said later that this is a raid on the Dominion treasury for some sinister purpose. If the money is got at all, it will be got by fact of parliament.

The Power Question.

The other question he had to speak upon was the electric energy from Niagara Falls. One proposition was for the government to take control and establish a plant to sell power to municipalities. The government was not prepared to favor this on account of the immense cost. The city of Toronto had asked, thru Mr. Crawford to instal a plant, and sell to other municipalities nor for arbitration. The legislature did not want to give Toronto the power to get lectrical energy for itself it should not have a monopoly. The bill

second to the cost would be shown second to the farther they were from the fails. For the scheme to work out properly, and all receive cheap electricity, the towns would have to move near to the fails. If the legislature undertook an enterprise of this kind it would have to be for the benefit of Ontario. Suppose the legislature harnessed Niagara, the flower could not be transmitted east of Cobourg. It would be a charge on the whole prostace, and Eastern Ontario would demand over from the St. Lawrence, the Magnetawan and the Ottawa.
